#### Were Left in Company's Trust Vault

Pending Sale of Gold Mine. A dispatch from Chicago states that the assay of six supposed bars of gold that had been placed in a trust com-pany's vault pending the completion of the sale of a mine from which the gold was supposed to have come, was completed today, and showed that the bars were composed of copper, zinc and other metals, without a trace of gold. The bars were left with the trust company by two men giving their names as R. G. Miller and William Schroeder, who published an advertise-

Schröder, who published an advertise-ment in a London paper offering to sell a gold mine for \$50,000, and Induced Sir Frederick Vigor and T. D. G. Dray-ton, of England, to come to the United States to close the deal. The English-men say they had borings taken from the bars, and on another seles they do the the bars, and an analysis showed the borings contained 76 per cent gold.

One of the Englishmen went with one of the alleged gold mine owners to California to see the mine, but says the owner disappeared suddenly one day, the other supposed owner disappearing from Chicago. This turn in affairs was precipitated by the demand of the Englishmen that their traveling exenses be paid. The Englishmen had a trust company appointed receiver for the six bars of supposed gold, and

the analysis which they ordered made will be sent to them in England. They sailed from New York Sunday.

### PARK CITY NOTES. New Method of Handling Silver King

## Ores Talked Of-Ore Shipments.

In its review of the week at Park City the Record says: If the judgment of experienced men is not at fault and the little information that has leaked misleading, a material and radical change in the mode and manner of taking out the ore of the great Silver King mine will shortly be inade. From what the writer can gather, it

is reasonably safe to predict that work on an immense shaft in the old Aliiance tunnel on the King side, at a consider-able distance southwest from the old shaft, will be the order, There are several logical reasons in

support of this, one of the most im-portant of which will be the doing away of the long haul now made necessary to the present holst. This shaft will, of course, connect with the King levels, and will furnish another exit and bet-

ter the air conditions. With this shaft once down, it is a very easy matter to follow the mine output from the shaft in this tunnel to the mouth of this avenue, where

large ore bins will be located. The sinking of this shaft has other very important features. It will pros-pect and develop Alliance, Old Samp-son, Boss and other ground, all belong-ing to the Silver King company, and ground which has practically gone un-prospected prospected.

The Record last week stated that an aerial tram was under consideration by the Silver King company, and has no reason to doubt that it was correct in the assertion, coming as it did, direct from Manager Kearns. But if the above departure is true, it will likely be short-lived, for the taking of the mine prod-uct through the Alliance tunned product through the Alliance tunnel practically settles all doubt that the Rio Grande Western will extend its track to this point. As a matter of fact, the surveyors are now at work on this route, and all the week have been en-gaged in running the line down Empire canyon to the point where the crossing to the Union Pacific spur at the old leacher has been decided upon.
