# CREDIT MEN'S BANQUET.

Assistant Secretary F. J. Stockwell Numbered Among the Speakers.

Last night's banquet of the Utah Asclation of Credit Men at the Commersociation of Credit Men at the Commer-cial club was attended by about 100 per-sons, including the guest of honor, As-nistant Secretary F. J. Stockwell of the National organization. President An-thur Parsons was toastmanter. He in-troduced Mr. Stockwell, remarking that Utah and Novada had no legislation for the protection of creditors, which the Utah association was endeavoring to rem-edy. Mr. Stockwell spoks on the objects and purposes of the National association which has a present membership of S.-500, and is a unification of credit men to protect mercantile credit and secure co-operation. He said the National associa-tion has a committee to watch current congressional legislation, always besing their requests on business principles. In 25 states the law prohibits sales of mer-chandise stocks without prevent fail-ures due to business men speculating and bucktarbop operations. The P.
