rous one for the titah Light and Power company and the year 1900 closes with a better power and light service than has ever been given to the citizens of Salt Lake City and Ogden. while the people are as a whole, well weased with the service of 1900, the empany is also well satisfied with the conditions at the close of the year.

As at present equipped the company has a maximum capacity of some 8,-500 horse power. This includes the power of the Ogden or Pioneer plant, in addition to the Cottonwood plants and the steam service, in Salt Lake City. All of these plants are at present running in parallel and in addition the company is running the engines at the west side sub-station and also the Salt Lake City Railway company's machin-

BIG STORAGE SCHEME.

It is the intention of the company to continue to keep well ahead of the demand and with this object in view the company has already projected a plan to store over ten billion gallons of water annually by a series of reservoirs to be constructed on the north, south and middle forks of Ogden river, to be used for power generating and irriga-tion purposes. The preliminary steps to this stupendous undertaking were recently begun by the company filing notices appropriating all the waters of Ogden river and suitable reservoir sites in the locality mentioned. AT BIG COTTONWOOD.

In addition to the above the company contemplates erecting a power plant at the mouth of Big Cottonwood canyon at the old Granite Paper Mill site; also constructing reservoirs in the canyon for the improvement of the whole sysem, thus greatly increasing the company's generating capacity. The gas output in Salt Lake City is 400,000 cubic feet per day while the Og-den plant is sending out 60,000 feet per day. Some improvements have been made in the Salt Lake plant this year.

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
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
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
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
