Par Rockaway, N. Y., 11.—Another shock of earthquake was felt in the village of Rockaway, New York, on Long Island this afternoon, not as heavy as yesterday, but sufficient to cause an excitement. At 12:30, and a few minutes later the hotel on Rockaway Beach was shaken, the windows rattled, and the chairs.
