**Local and Other Matters.**

FROM TUESDAY'S DAILY, OCT. 14.

**More Indictments.**—Seven other indictments have been by the grand jury, which swells the number to 14, all for offenses amenable to the laws of the Territory.

**"Chronicle" Clippings.**—Rails are constantly being received for Utah Southern.

On the afternoon of the 8th inst., at Beaver, Commissary Sergeant Dowd, of Fort Cameron, was thrown from his horse and seriously if not fatally injured.

**From the Islands.**—Elders Jacob Gates, Jr., and John S. Woodbury, both of St. George, returned yesterday morning from a mission to the Sandwich Islands. The former made us a brief call last evening. He had been absent from home about two years and nine months, all of which, saving the time of going and coming, he had spent in the Islands, laboring at different periods on the plantation at Oahu, and traveling and preaching on all the principal islands. He was in excellent health, and expected to start for St. George immediately.

**Twenty-two Years in Service.**—Brother Richard Matthews, our pressman, on Saturday evening completed his 22nd year as an employe of this establishment, during which period, excepting his apprenticeship in the same department, he has steadily retained the situation he now occupies, without respite or cessation, winning from his employers and fellow workmen the esteem and good will which follows as the fruit of faithful service and the reward of many excellent qualities of heart. We wish Brother Matthews a long life of peace, happiness and prosperity.

**From the South.**—Brother E. W. East, an old friend and former resident of this city, where he is well and widely known, called upon us this morning. He is located in Apache County, Arizona, at present, on the Shojo, a branch of Silver Creek running into Little Colorado, and is up to Salt Lake for the purpose of settling some business prior to returning permanently to the "sunny south."

He reports Southern Utah as literally "burnt up" by the drouth, as well as some parts of Arizona. Cattle were dying for want of feed already, and this winter would no doubt perish by hundreds.

The People, etc. vs. Wm. Matthews and Wm. Downes; grand larceny. Wm. Matthews duly arraigned, plead not guilty. Bond fixed at \$300.

Elizabeth M. Townsend vs. W. H. Hooper et al.; trial resumed and still in progress.

**Missionary Work.**—Elder J. H. Van Natta writes from Choctaw County, Mississippi, under date of the 28th ult., to the Eighth Quorum of Seventies. He was at that time in company with Elder Bliss, of Salt Lake, having left Alabama on

the 9th of September for his present field of labor. He had visited the place last April, held several meetings and promised to return, and since doing so had baptized nine adults, five men and four women, who, with their families, numbering in all about 20 souls, were on the point of emigrating. Others were enquiring after the truth, and, as usual, many were stirred up to anger in consequence. The branch was known as the Mt. Airy Branch, Presided over by H. P. Dotson who, with Martin L. Oswalt, had been ordained to the office of Elder. Elders Van Natta and Bliss had been treated well on all hands, and were preparing to return to Alabama, where their assistance was much needed.

**Funeral.**—The funeral of Sister Ann G. Kimball, wife of the late President Heber C. Kimball, was held in the 19th Ward Meeting House, yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock. A goodly number of the relatives and friends of the deceased were in attendance, and some very interesting and consolatory remarks were made by Elders Orson Pratt, Joseph F. Smith and George Q. Cannon.

**Growing Timber.**—Apropos of the remarks of His Excellency Gov. Emery and Hon. George Q. Cannon, at the opening of the Territorial Fair, Oct. 1st, regarding the growing of timber, Mr. D. W. Rogers, of Provo, writes that he has on hand 10,000 trees, from four to eight years old, black and white walnut, and white, bay and Spanish oaks. He had tried the hickory but it would not prosper. The elm would do well. Mr. Rogers is in the 93rd year of his age, unable to attend to his forest, and desires to sell out. He will take pleasure in giving instructions concerning the growth and proper care of the trees.

**Hot Shot.**—In the District Court Room, yesterday, during the progress of the Townsend trial, one of the attorneys for the plaintiff, a prominent character in the delinquent tax case recently disposed of, as is his custom of late, threw out an irrelevant allusion on the name of President Young. Col. Merritt, of the defense retorted. "See here, Judge, he has been dead over two years, and you have had the privilege of administering his estate. It seems to me that you ought to be contented to let matters rest." "Administering" was a point that "took," as the loud laugh that followed gave evidence. **Enquirer Notes.**—In the First District Court, last Monday, B. T. Young, of Richfield, for false pretenses, was fined \$100, and costs taxed at \$67.50, and sentenced to one day's imprisonment in the Sevier County jail.

Last Saturday, the new board of directors of the Provo Manufacturing Company met and qualified, and elected officers as follows: A. O. Smoot, Sr., president; M. Tanner, vice-president; James Dunn, superintendent; John R. Twelves, secretary; W. C. A. Smoot, Jr., treasurer.

On Sunday last, the stackyard of Mr. James King, Provo bench, caught fire from flying sparks from a stovepipe and burned up all his hay, corn and other truck stored therein.

**Dismissed.**—The Grand Jury have dismissed the cases of Bane vs. Musser and Musser vs. Bane from consideration. It will be remembered that for assaulting Mr. A. M. Musser several months ago, Bane and Elliot were found guilty of assault with intent to do bodily injury and held in the sum of \$500 each to answer to the grand jury, and that soon afterward Messrs. Musser, A. McRae and E. Tufts were also bound over in \$500 each, to await the action of the same body; the charge against the latter persons being magnified into an "assault with intent to kill." The grand jury couldn't see it in that light, however, and considering both offenses about equal in criminality, and as matters more worthy the attention of the police court than any other tribunal, dismissed the affair entirely.

The case of the three tramps arrested in Ogden in a bonded car some time ago, has also been dismissed.
