New York, Sept. 3.—"After the payment of my just debts, it is my desire that my entire estate, both real and personal, go to my wife, Be-atrice Cameron Mansfield." This, one of the shortest wills on record, is the last will and testament of Richard Mansfield, the getor. It was made in 1894, when Mrs. Mane-field, who had been the wife of the actor for two years, retired from the stage. No will was made after that time. No codicit was added. As he thought then, he thought when he died, and the widow was named as the sole executrix without bond. Probably worth \$100,000 when he married, the first act of the great player was to deed it to his wife. In the years that followed, as his sea-sons showed profits of from \$50,000 to \$60,000, the money was invested as his judgment indicated, in real es-tate and the deeds made out in his wife's name. ply considering that it has at its dispos-al during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1907, appropriations aggregating \$33,-551,769. Since the occupancy of Cuba by our American soldiers and felicious-ly called "the army of pacification," the quartermaster's department has ex-pended for this occupancy \$2,554,970, which is reimburseable to the American treasury by the Cuban government when it gets on its feet once more. Gen, Aleshire calls attention to the fact that larger appropriations must be made for his department due to the increasing cost of labor and supplies. He says the increase of cost in almost all directions is of such general knowl-edge that he does not deem it wise to cite any specific cases. At times it has been necessary to submit deficiency es-timates, sometimese for large sums, but in some of the deficiency estimates they have arisen through causes no human foresight could anticipate and others, Gen. Aleshire asys, may be expected in the future. While the quartermastor general makes a plea for economy he believes it bad economy to cut down estimates on the theory that a policy which looks only to the immediate say-ing of money may in the end prove un-aconnical.
