LOCAL BRIEFS.

Oratorical Contest—Seven girls will contest this evening, in the Central Christian church for the W. C. T. U. oratorical silver medal.

Taken to Provo—John T. Amick, who was committed to the State Mental hospital yesterday afternoon, was taken to Provo last night by Deputy Sheriff Steele and Slater.

King Is Released—Hong Ling, the Chinese student arrested by Inspector T. J. Langley of the immigration service at Rock Springs, has been released by the United States commissioner at that point after a hearing.

Back to School—Sept. 17.—The city schools will open Sept. 17 next, a week later than customary, on account of the delay in completing the new buildings through scarcity of brick. The indications are that the schools will be badly crowded.

Buys More Property—The Tribune has acquired 27 1/2 x 107 1/2 feet north of the Progress building on Commercial street, from Maria V. Dougal as the quarters for the lighting and heating plant of the paper when the transfer is made from the West Temple street building.

Tribune-Reporter—The Reporter Printing company and the Tribune Job Printing company have consolidated under the name of the Tribune-Reporter Printing company, with \$50,000 capital, J. T. Harris, president; Julius Loveland, vice president, and L. C. Shneider, secretary and treasurer.

Simmons Wants Pardon—Stephen S. Simmons, inmate of the state prison, has filed application with the state board of pardons for pardon. Simmons was sentenced to life in 1905 to two years from Summit county, for burglary. He has behaved himself very well during confinement, and is a trusty.

Murray Under Arrest—Murdock Murray was arrested yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Hill Emery upon a charge of beating his board bill in Park City. Sheriff Hill of Summit county will take Murray back to stand trial today. The amount of the board bill which it is claimed Murray tried to beat is \$100.

Solicitors Arrested—Deputy Sheriff Sharp and Smith yesterday afternoon arrested H. F. Hanby and Thomas Weaver, two solicitors employed by a local paper, upon the charge of embezzlement. It is claimed that the men had been collecting money for subscriptions and failed to turn it in to the paper.

Stenographer Appointed—County Clerk Eldredge has appointed Mrs. Minnie McKendall as stenographer in his office to succeed Mrs. P. A. Clark, nee Edgington, who resigned recently on account of her marriage. The appointment of Mrs. McKendall was confirmed by the county commissioners yesterday afternoon.

Offers for Property—David Keith has been approached with tentative offers for his Tenth ward square which formerly was occupied by the D. A. & M. society, but which has been vacant since the removal of the society from the state fair grounds. Parties are talking of buying the property to be used as a pleasure park.

Takes Oath of Office—Asst. United States District Attorney M. M. M. yesterday afternoon took the oath of office before Miss Margaret B. Connel, deputy clerk in the office of the federal court. His commission will date from Aug. 16, and before that time Pennington, who has held the office six years, will have tendered his resignation.

Veterans Social—The Spanish veterans held a well attended social and musical entertainment last evening, when the program already published was carried out, and there were in addition addresses from W. Felder of Dakota, H. Armstrong of Indiana, A. Green of Montana, Capt. Wedgwood and others. The veterans will hold an outing at the Salt Palace next Monday.

Joins His Regiment—First Lieut. Edwin O. Saunders of the Twenty-ninth Infantry has gone to join his regiment at the camp of instruction in Wyoming. Sergt. Huddleston of H company, Twenty-ninth Infantry, has gone to Washington to be examined for promotion to a second lieutenancy. The first recruit from the new Salt Lake recruiting station for army service is John C. Bush of Fond du Lac, who has enlisted for the cavalry service.

Registration Light—According to reports received by County Clerk Eldredge, the registration yesterday was unusually light all over the city. It is estimated that there were not more than 100 new voters registered in all the districts. In some only one was registered, in others two and in several none at all were registered. As the time approaches for the election the registration will increase and on the last few days it is expected that it will be very heavy.

Accused of Larceny—Detectives Shannon and Wilson yesterday afternoon placed under arrest an Austrian named Charles Luckner, on a charge of petty larceny. The man was employed at Amerbach's store, and it is alleged that while he was cleaning out a basement and carting away paper and refuse that he also took with him to a place of hiding, bolts of dry goods. He was detected, it is claimed, in the act of sorting some of the articles taken, and the arrest followed.

Entries for Elstadded—A number of entries have been registered for the Sunday school, scheduled to be held at Salt Lake, Aug. 27. The contest is open to any Sunday school choir in the state, and there will be two prizes, \$40 for the best 20 voiced choir, and \$25 for the best 15 voiced choir. Over 20 entries are expected. The applications up to date are from Sugar House ward, Twenty-second ward, First Baptist church, Twenty-seventh ward, Salt Lake; Fourth ward of Ogden, Farmington, Bonifield, Kayville and the Second ward of Ogden.

COUNCIL PASSED RALEIGH MATTER

Goes Over for One Week—Gives Fernstrom Time for Report.

INVESTIGATION SCANDAL.

Minority Is Expected to Hand Out a Red Hot Roast to the Street Supervisor.

There was nothing done by the council last night in regard to the charges against Street Supervisor J. T. Raleigh with the exception that the majority report exonerating Raleigh was submitted and, upon motion of Fernstrom, was laid over for one week. By that time it is expected that Fernstrom will have his minority report ready to be submitted to the council. The charges were made against Raleigh by William Jones, who was discharged, it is claimed, because he refused to discharge some Mormons under him shortly after they had contributed to the campaign fund. Raleigh was also charged with compelling his employees to contribute 10 per cent of their wages to the "American" campaign fund. A special committee consisting of Mulvey, Crabtree and Fernstrom was appointed to investigate the charges but the majority of the committee, after hearing testimony in the matter, completely exonerated Raleigh. The report contains the following reference to the matter: "Your committee deems it waste of time to go into detail on charges so trivial and scurrilous, and we recommend that all papers be filed."

In his minority report it is expected that Fernstrom will hand out a hard roast to the street supervisor and his department and the matter will be fought out on the floor of the council.

MORE FOR MORAN.

If the recommendation of Supt. of Waterworks Hines is adopted by the council, and there is hardly any doubt that it will be, P. J. Moran will get another extra job in connection with the waterworks system. The extra work will consist of overhauling and repairing the Parley canyon reservoir and putting in a new concrete bottom. The communication of the superintendent in regard to the matter leaves no doubt as to who will get the job although the name of the contractor is not mentioned. The communication, which follows in full, was referred to the city engineer for immediate action.

There being no urgent need during this season for the water from Cottonwood conduit, I would suggest that water be not turned into the system until the Parley's reservoir be thoroughly overhauled, the walls repaired and the bottom covered. By making arrangements to flume the water from the Parley's reservoir, this work could be done at any time now.

I would recommend that this matter be referred to the city engineer, as the contractor is on the ground with material and the work could be done much cheaper now than by having the contractor move back.

FERNSTROM RESOLUTION.

The Fernstrom resolution, protesting against the health department dumping garbage on the lot at Third and Tenth West streets and creating a nuisance, was ordered filed upon recommendation of the sanitary committee, as the mayor and committee have ordered the dumping stopped. The resolution also asked for an investigation of the charge that the watchmen at the regular city dump had set fire to the refuse there and thus created a nuisance. After the committee report had been read Fernstrom asked what was done in regard to the charge against the watchmen. He said that if the report was true that Mullen had set fire to the dump he should be discharged. None of the members of the committee volunteered to answer the question, so the matter was dropped.

AMENDED ORDINANCE.

An amended ordinance was passed fixing the license of cabmen, draymen and expressmen. The ordinance made no material change in the amount of the license, but it provides that the license shall be paid yearly in advance. This was done at the request of the draymen and expressmen in order to bar some who come here for a few months each year and enter into the business during the busy season and get the license for nothing. The ordinance also provided for a short time under the old ordinance.

A resolution was introduced by Black authorizing the street supervisor to tear up the tracks of the Utah Light & Railway company, Sixth, East street and on Fourth South street from West Temple to Fifth West and on Fifth West from Third to Fourth South streets, as the company has forfeited its rights to the tracks because of not operating within the time for some time past. The resolution was adopted.

O'Donnell introduced a resolution providing for the employment of an additional watchman at the city dumping ground at a salary of \$25 per day. The resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote.

CITIZENS' PETITION.

E. D. Miller and 13 other residents on North Temple street petitioned the council to order the city creek canal on that street from East Temple street to Third West, as its present open condition is dangerous to the public. The matter was referred to the streets committee.

A petition was received from about 100 farmers, gardeners and hucksters from Woods Cross, Bonifield, Centerville and Farmington, asking that the city council provide a market place where they may market their produce in this city without having to stand their teams on the street for hours and block traffic in front of the stores. The matter was referred to the markets committee and will be considered Thursday evening.

TANKMEN TURNED DOWN.

The request of six tankmen in the water department for an increase in salary from \$65 to \$75 per month was denied upon the recommendation of the waterworks committee. The request of three other tankmen in City Creek canyon for an increase from \$65 to \$80 per month met a similar fate.

The request of Supt. Hines for authority to employ six special water inspectors in his department to enforce the lawn sprinkling regulations was also denied by the council.

APPOINTMENT CONFIRMED.

The council confirmed the appointment of Daniel Grundy as patrol driver, and the transfer of Robert J. Golding from patrol driver to mounted policeman.

The removal of J. T. Berry from the fire department by Chief Vail was concurred in by the council.

Chief Sheets submitted the appointment of Joan Hardin as special policeman at the Short Line yards in North Salt Lake to serve without pay from the city. The appointment was confirmed.

The board of public works asked authority to advertise for bids for the

construction of stone cross-walks at the street intersections. The matter was referred to the streets and engineering committees.

Mrs. John Kooyman Angered and Created a Scene.

After her husband had tried to secure a warrant for her arrest upon the charge of assault, Mrs. John Kooyman slapped his face yesterday afternoon just outside the county attorney's office in the city and county building and told him in plain words what she thought of him. Kooyman did not strike back at his wife, but cried like a baby after the punishment had been administered. The couple have lived apart for some time, and it is claimed that Kooyman has failed to support his wife and seven children since last Christmas.

She filed a complaint against him, charging him with failing to provide for his children, but owing to the fact that Kooyman met with an accident in which his leg was broken some time ago, he was not arrested upon that charge.

His wife met him on the street yesterday and took his watch away from him and proceeded to beat him up. Kooyman at once started for the county attorney's office and was followed by his wife. He asked the attorney upon the charge of assault, but the attorney refused to issue it. When Kooyman left the office, he met his wife who slapped his face and denounced him in bitter terms. Both then had a crowd of curious spectators in a very short time.

PAINTER INJURED.

John White Fell from Smokestack a Distance of 15 Feet.

John White, a painter, was seriously injured yesterday afternoon by falling from a smokestack upon which he was working. The accident occurred at the Inland Crystal Salt company's plant, this side of Saltair beach. The stack is 35 feet high, and Mr. White was suspended by ropes fastened at the top. The fire in the furnace was extinguished by hot water from the boiler and the platform upon which the painter was standing fell to the ground, precipitating him a distance of 15 feet. He struck upon the boiler, and was picked up by the men on the ground. The scalp was badly cut, and a fractured rib was noticed. The injured man was removed to the L. D. S. hospital where his injuries were attended by Dr. W. F. Beer. The condition of the patient was reported today as being favorable, and it is believed that he will speedily recover.

UNSUCCESSFUL BIDDER.

City Engineer Kelsey Failed in Effort To Land Contract.

City Engineer Kelsey was an unsuccessful bidder for the engineering work of the new water system at Grand Junction, Colo., recently. The contract was awarded to Young & Kelsey of this city last Thursday night. The Grand Junction Daily News has the following story in connection with the matter: "The engineering firm of Kelsey & Young of Salt Lake City was engaged last evening by the city council to act as consulting and constructive engineers of the mountain water extension. They will receive 4 per cent of the complete cost of the extension for their work. This sum will include all of their expenses and the wages of a resident engineer and all incidental bills that might be contracted by the engineers during the survey."

Before a final decision was reached by the council on the recommendation of the special water committee, the four applicants for the position, Messrs. Young, Kelsey, Schwabach and Kelsey, were called before the council and each one was given five minutes to make his position or proposition clear to the members of the council.

L. C. Kelsey, city engineer of the city of Salt Lake, made a brief but vigorous statement to the effect that he had been in the engineering business for 15 years; that he had charge of the extensive works now being put in by the city of Salt Lake, and that he would give the Grand Junction proposition all his time and energy to make it a success if possible.

Gov. Willard Young then arose and spoke for the firm of Kelsey & Young of Salt Lake. The partner of Mr. Young is a brother of L. C. Kelsey. Mr. Young opened his remarks with a brief appreciation of the speaker who had preceded him. "But, gentlemen of the council," he declared, "Mr. L. C. Kelsey has no place here in Grand Junction bidding on your system. He states that he is city engineer of Salt Lake. He is. He succeeded me to that position. He is a city engineer. He is a great work that Mr. L. C. Kelsey has on his hands in Salt Lake at present. I say to him and to you, that his position is not here asking for your contracts but back in Salt Lake doing his work there." Mr. Young then declared that his firm was the only one in the country that would have charge of the Grand Junction work, if their firm was chosen, was one of the best hydraulic engineers in the United States and considered so by all army engineers.

At the close of Mr. Young's address, Mr. L. C. Kelsey declared that in regard to the statement of his brother, he had

to the statement of Col. Young, that he had 20 assistants in Salt Lake to help him carry out the city's plans as to what he could give the Grand Junction system at the time it required. He also offered Mr. Schwabach the position of resident engineer of the water extension, the same salary offered by Col. Young.
