Washington, Feb. 3.-The Republicans of the house of representatives in conference this afternoon adopted as a party measure the bill extending ratemaking powers to the interstate commission, as agreed on by the committee on interstate and foreign commerce, and known as the Eschrownsend bill. The conference instructed the house committee on rules bring in a rule providing for consideration of the measure beginning on Tuesday and continuing until 4 o'clock Wednesday, when a vote shall be taken. Wednesday, which a vote shart se taken. No amendments will be allowed to the bil, although the first vote is to be taken on the Davey bill, as the Demo-eratic substitute for legislation on the talway rate subject. The conference, which lasted three

ratic substitute for legislation on the alway rate subject. The conference, which lasted three hours, developed opposition to the resource. The only test vote taken was a motion to postpone the matter for a further conference next Tuesday. This was lost, 44 to 107. Efforts were made to amend the bill during the conference, but all of these failed. Fault was found with the bill on the ground that it did not include regula-tions for the private car evil and ter-minal charges. The advocates of the bill contested these criticisms, claiming that authority was contained in the full to correct the complained of evils. INDIAN TRUST FUNDS, President's Connection With

Their Diversion Justified.

Washington, Feb. 3.—At the cabinet meeting today, Sec. Hitchcock took up the subject of the use of Indian trust funds for the benefit of sectarian schools. Francis E Leupp, commis-sioner of Indian affairs, was called in-to the conference

to the conference President Roosevelt's connection with the diversion of Indian trust funds to the support of Catholic mission schools is explained and justified in a commun-ication addressed to the president by Aity.-Gen. Moody, which was filed to-day with the senate committee on Indian affairs by William H. Ketcham, director of the bureau of Catholic Indian missions.

Father Ketcham appeared before the committee to defend his bureau against the charges that it has been using un-due and political influence to secure the Mr. Moody's communication, dated Feb. 2, 1905, sets forth the record of a cabinet meeting, held in January, 1904, when the question of the use of Indian funds for sectarian schools was discussed, and the president asked for an opinion as to his authority to direct that contracts be made for the use of such funds by denominational educational institutions. Senator Knox, then attorney-general, decided that the action of Congress in declaring it to be the policy of the government not to permit the use of the public moneys of the American people for sectarian purposes, did not repeal previous laws giving to the secretary of the interior discretion to use the Indian funds in
