The picture is that of a "Mormon" meetinghouse recently crected at Tomstown, Franklin county, Pennsylvania. The structure was begun in April, 1903, and was dedicated June 26, 1904, President J. G. McQuarris of the Eastern States mission, President Ciarence Snow and the Elders of the West Pennsylvania conference being present. The house is built of rock, has an inside measurement of about 24x36 feet, and will seat something like 150 persons. The principal work on its erection was done by Elders J. L. Smith, J. H. Glover, David Pulsipher and J. H. Parkin, who hauled the rock, mixed the mortar and hewed the timbers, ably assisted by Saints and friends. Tomstown is an historic neighborhood. It is situated within a mile of Sidney Rigdon's "New Jerusalem," and there has been a branch of the Church there for between 40 and 50 years. From this section many stalwart Latterday Saints have emigrated, chief among them being the late President Hess of Davis county. The building shown above is the only "Mormon" meetnighouse in the Eastern States mission, and is therefore much appreciated by the Elders and Saints. In it weekly meetings are held, attended by not only members of the Church, but by friends of the Elders, who render them all the as zistance possible in their laudable efforts to spread the principles of truth.

Parents should teach their children the Gospel and none should be so recreant to their duties as to let their children grow up in ignorance of the divine mission of the Prophet Joseph Smith the Prophet Joseph Smith.

President Smith urged faithfulness on the part of the Saints in the pay-ment of tithes. Those who refuse to settle with the Lord until the obligations to their neighbors are met, are more or less dishonest, and persisted in, such a course will lead to the ignorin, such a course will lead to the ignor-ing of other vital principles of the Gos-pel, until the person has forfeited all the light he once had. He contrasted the Gospel of Christ with the denomi-nations of the world and said there is no truth in any denomination or organ-ization that we do not have.

President Smith referred to the doc trine of the resurrection as under-stood by the Saints in contrast to the uncertain understanding of the world. H_{e} bore a strong testimony to the truth of a literal resurrection, and said, while the principle upon which this wonder-ful condition is accomplished by the Lord is somewhat of a mystery, it is not nearly so great as that of the begin-ning of life. When one is converted to the problem of the beginning of life, which cannot be denied, it should not appear impossible for the Lord to ra-turn the various parts of the body to their proper condition

their proper condition. At the Mutual Improvement confer-ence, President Smith spoke mainly upon the principle of marriage. He dwelt upon the divinity of the marriage covenant, and showed the damper of members of the Church, of either sex, marrying outside thereof. Such unions, he said, in nine cases out of ten result in misery and failure. He admonished the young people to consider the sub-ject of marriage, and never enter into it except through the channel God has ordained, which means eternal union progress and posterity.

President Lund dwelt upon the con-trast between the Gospel of Christ and Christendom. He showed that the Pro-phet Joseph Smith had received revela-tions which enabled him to establish the Church of Christ on the earth again, and that miracles and other efficient of the Gosmal were in again, and that miracles and other gifts common to the Gospel were in-troduced, through him, by the Lord, He showed the danger of Saints looking for miracles, and that, in many cases, those who have been converted as result of miracles have left the faith on account of not having continuous
