

GOVERNMENT RESTS IN MITCHELL'S CASE

Senator's Former Private Secretary Tells of His Employer's Fear of Prosecution.

HIS TESTIMONY WAS DIRECT.

Defense Opens—Many Witnesses Testified They Had Received Senator's Aid but He Refused Compensation.

Portland, Ore., June 26.—Only less damaging than the testimony offered by Judge Albert A. Tanner were the statements of Harry Robertson, United States Mitchell's former private secretary, to the cause of the senator today. Robertson was put on the stand this morning by the prosecution, and told fully, without reservation, of their conversations with Mitchell at Washington, of the latter's fear of prosecution for his work before the department; and of Mitchell's rage when Robertson expressed to his employer the belief that denial was useless, as several knew of the connection of the firm of Mitchell & Tanner with the work of getting the Kribs claims expedited and the likelihood that the whole story would come out.

After recounting when and how he became acquainted with the senator and the firm of Mitchell & Tanner, Robertson, in answer to the questions of United States Dist. Atty. Henry, told what he knew of the Kribs matter and its relations to Senator Mitchell.

The witness stated that he had seen Kribs in the office many times, and, speaking of the partnership agreement, said he had written a couple of copies of it in July, 1902, at the request of Senator Mitchell.

Upon being subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury, the witness said, he went to Senator Mitchell and showed him the subpoena, asking him what he could be wanted in Portland for. The senator said it was to do with the Kribs matter, and told him to go to the Kribs and see what he could do for them.

Robertson testified that Mitchell had insisted that he had done nothing more, and that he would swear to the statement he intended to put in his published interview, "on a stack of a thousand Bibles."

"If you did," was the alleged reply of Robertson, "you would testify to what is not true."

The evidence given by Robertson was direct. He identified the letter addressed by Mitchell at Washington to be delivered to Tanner, but which was given to Henry and the grand jury, keeping nothing back, but telling the truth of his recollection of the plan made by Mitchell and Tanner to evade prosecution and how these schemes came to naught.

Neither Orton nor Bridges was cross-examined.

Robertson underwent a severe cross-examination by Senator Thorne, but the defense could not shake his testimony. The government rested its case at 2:45 p. m.

The defense then opened its case calling T. O. Abbott of Seattle, W. H. Odell of Salem, D. P. Kribs of Roseburg, A. D. Sullivan of Portland, W. D. Whitcomb of Portland, and T. B. Wilcox of this city, all of whom testified to having received assistance from the defendant before various departments, in each case of which the senator had refused to accept compensation.

The case of the defense will be continued and perhaps finished tomorrow. It is the opinion that Senator Mitchell will take the stand in his own behalf.

Court opened with the call of Judge De Haven for the cases remaining on the docket. He announced that the defendant in the case of Congressman T. N. Williamson, State Senator J. D. May and others, had been overruled. Dist. Atty. Henry desired that the case of the United States against Williamson, Clenden and Higga be the next called, and by order of the court the case was set for next Monday, while the court announced that all of the cases yet remaining on the land fraud calendar would be set for hearing on Friday next.

PREFERRED SUICIDE TO SEPARATION

Patterson, N. J., June 26.—Unable to endure a long separation in the foreign service to which he was assigned, Henry Eichenrodt, bandmaster of the United States band at Albany, and his young wife to whom he had been united less than a year, committed suicide today.

Eichenrodt married Clara Felsold of this city, and their life was very happy, although the bandmaster's duties only permitted him to visit his bride at long intervals. After the last cruise of the Sixth Atlantic fleet he came home and was to have rejoined his ship tonight with the understanding that he would not again have shore leave because he was to be transferred to the Asiatic station. The young couple were deeply depressed at their approaching separation. Today friends gathered at his home to bid him adieu. The bandmaster, however, was found dead in their bedroom and clasped in each other's arms. Examination showed that after turning on the gas both had swallowed carbolic acid. Mrs. Eichenrodt was 28 years old and her husband 28.

DEMENTED PROSPECTORS FOUND IN DEATH VALLEY

Goldfield, Nev., June 26.—Prospectors coming into Bullfrog today report that they found two men wandering aimlessly about in Death Valley down beyond the Funeral range. These two men were insane and absolutely naked. Their tongues were black, swollen and protruding. Their limbs were also swollen. The men had evidently become delirious from thirst while prospecting through Death Valley. Their misfortune is but a repetition of the disaster of that region during the past week. The springs are drying up and the usual supply of water is lacking. The prospectors are so scattered that the vast region that they roam is a way of warning them. Carcasses of men and burros heavy laden and without owners have been found in numbers. This season of the year is unfit for all prospecting. The men are being taken to health and steps are being taken for their identification.

BIG CHICAGO GRAIN FIRM HAS FAILED.

Chicago, June 26.—Knight, Donnelly & Co., one of the most widely known grain and stock brokerage firms in the west and of reputed financial standing throughout the business world, became involved in involuntary bankruptcy proceedings in the United States district court late this afternoon.

Three petitioning creditors, with claims amounting to \$100,000, filed the petition before Judge Landis, and Edward C. Potter was appointed receiver in bonds of \$100,000. The bankruptcy proceedings are believed to be the result of the presence in court of Atty. Silas H. Strawn, representing H. H. Donnelly, one of the members of the firm.

According to the petition for the receiver, there is \$250,000 outstanding in various kinds of grain, stock and bond transactions. Atty. Whitney, who is the broker, declared tonight that the failure would cause little excitement on the Chicago board of trade or the New York stock exchange tomorrow morning, as the trade is so evenly balanced that the transactions on the long side of the market will, to a great extent, offset the trades on the short side.

For every transaction made by the firm, said Mr. Whitney, "the Chicago board held collateral and if the market fell on the present market price money will be gained instead of lost."

The petition for the appointment of a receiver sets forth that if an attempt is not immediately made to realize on the \$250,000 worth of transactions, the debt will necessarily have to be closed out at a great sacrifice.

H. H. Donnelly, senior member of the firm, declared tonight that no one would be harmed financially, but he refused to give any reason for the failure of the company. He said:

"As near as I can estimate tonight, our liabilities are about \$250,000 and our assets about \$300,000. This estimate is made by taking as a basis the closing prices of stocks and grain today. As soon as receiver Potter comes up tomorrow, the firm of Knight, Donnelly & Co. will be dissolved."

The firm had wires running to New York, St. Louis and other leading financial centers of the country.

Boy Badly Mangled by Train

Bedding, Cal., June 26.—Walter J. Clark, son of wealthy parents in Boston, was found in a mangled condition today near Elmore. He had been riding a ride on a freight train and fell off. The left side of his body was badly mangled.

Bad Rear-End Collision

Louisville, Ky., June 26.—Three persons were killed and 15 injured in a rear-end collision on the Illinois Central railroad near Vine Grove, Ky., 10 miles west of Louisville, this afternoon.

CHAIRMAN MORTON BRINGS AN ACTION.

Trying to Recover Money Alleged to Have Been Wrongfully Taken From Equitable.

IS CUTTING OFF PERQUISITES.

Directors Got \$25 for Attending Executive Meetings Even When Not Present.

New York, June 26.—As chairman of the Equitable Life Assurance society's board of directors, Paul Morton has begun legal proceedings to recover money alleged to have been wrongfully taken from the society, and he also has cut off certain perquisites in the society. Mr. Morton tonight made the following statement:

"I have retained Austin G. Fox and Wallace McFarlane as special counsel for the Equitable society in connection with the investigation of the past financial transactions of the society by Price, Waterhouse & Co. and Hoskins & Sells, chartered accountants, which is now in progress, and to institute such legal proceedings as they may consider to be appropriate for the recovery of any more and property to which the Equitable is found to be entitled as the result of their examination. Messrs. Fox and McFarlane have been instructed to put themselves in communication with the attorney general and the insurance department, and to act in harmony with them."

"It has been the rule heretofore to allow directors \$25 for attending executive committee meetings of the Equitable society, and these allowances were made whether the directors were present or absent."

"This has been changed. No director will be allowed to receive such allowances at the meetings, and no officer or employee who happens to be a director will hereafter receive any fee for attending board meetings of any kind."

AN AMATEUR BANDIT.

Traveling Man in Spokane Jail For a Hold-Up.

Spokane, Wash., June 26.—Will C. Ribson, a traveling man representing a firm at Portland, Ore., is in jail charged with an attempt at a hold-up. Ribson is identified as the man who entered Dan's saloon, near the city hall, about 11 o'clock this morning and struck the proprietor with a brick bat, and fled with a heavy iron. The blow failed to stun Ribson and a fight followed, after which the robber fled but was captured in Davenport's restaurant.

Ribson, who is said to draw a salary of \$250 per month, was alleged to have been under the influence of liquor when the attempt to rob the saloon was made.

GENERAL PAPER CO. Milwaukee Publishers Declare it Is a Trust.

Milwaukee, June 26.—The newspaper publishers of Milwaukee have been cited to appear at the hearing in the district court of the federal government against the General Paper company, L. T. Boyd, representing the Milwaukee Journal, today told of the differences in prices now and before the organization of the General Paper company. He testified that in 1899, when the last contract was made for paper from the organization of the paper companies, the prices were \$1.10 per hundred pounds, and that now the price was \$2.25.

Before the year 1899 contract bids were received from all over the country, but since the General Paper company was organized only one bid was received.
