

The two year's financial reports of Davis, Morgan and Millard Counties were presented.

A motion was made that the Sergeant-at-Arms be instructed to furnish each member of both houses with a copy of the Compiled Laws of the United States, and the Laws at Large passed by Congress during the years 1878 and 1879, and that they be retained for the use of future Legislatures.

The financial reports of Beaver and Rich Counties, for 1878-79, were presented.

A bill to establish the validity of divorces, was presented, read and referred to the Committee on Judiciary; sixty copies were ordered printed.

The freedom of the House was extended to President John Taylor, Mayor Little, Hons. W. H. Hooper and William Jennings. Chief Justice Hunter, Judges Emerson and Boreman, P. H. Van Zile, M. Shaughnessy, Surveyor General Salomon, General John E. Smith, Judge E. Smith, Judge Snow, Dr. Park, T. B. Lewis, M. M. Bane, John B. Neal, O. J. Hollister, People's Territorial Central Committee and People's County Committee.

Messrs. Penrose, Jaques and Dusenberry were appointed a committee to draft resolutions of respect to the memory of the late Hon. A. P. Rockwood.

House adjourned till 2 p. m. Friday.

Friday, January 16, 1880.
House met pursuant to adjournment.

Speaker in the chair.
Roll called. Quorum present.
Prayer by the chaplain.

A communication from the Auditor of Public Accounts, announcing a vacancy in the office of Recorder of Marks and Brands in consequence of the decease of William Clayton, and asking that the vacancy be filled as soon as possible as the business of the office was accumulating. The communication was referred to the committee on agriculture, trades and manufactures.

The Territorial Auditor also reported the property now in the hands of the respective clerks of the three Judicial Districts of the Territory.

Mr. Winn presented a petition of Carl J. E. Field and 120 others asking for amendments to the charter of the City of Lehi, and moved its reference to the committee on municipal corporations and townsites. Referred.

Mr. Sharp, chairman of railroads, reported back without amendments (H. F. 2), which was taken up on its second reading by sections.

The bill was read the third time by its title, and passed; and was sent to the Council.

Mr. Lyman presented (H. F. 5), A Bill for an Act amending Sec. 2,108 of the Compiled Laws of Utah defining grand larceny. Taken up on its second reading, pending which, it was referred to the committee on judiciary.

Mr. Lyman then took the Chair.

Mr. Francis presented H. F. No. 6, "A bill for an act conferring exclusive original jurisdiction on Justices of the Peace."

Read the first time and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Mr. Johnson presented a motion extending the freedom of the House to the following gentlemen: Hon. J. M. Bernhisel, the Probate Judges of the several counties, Bishop Edward Hunter, L. J. Nuttall, Esq., Prof. O. H. Riggs and F. M. Bishop.

Speaker in the chair.
Minutes called for.
House adjourned until Monday, Jan. 19, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Monday, Jan. 19, 1880.
Mr. Grover presented petitions, asking an appropriation of \$801.12 for the reconstruction of Sevier Bridge and of \$37.50 loss on Territorial delinquent taxes. Referred to the committee on claims and appropriations.

Mr. Grover presented financial report of Juab County. Referred.
Mr. Farr presented the petition of Richard Ballantyne and 112 others to prohibit the use of barbed or other wire fences. Referred to committee on agriculture, etc.

Mr. Dusenberry presented the claim of Mrs. M. Miller for boarding 12 jurors and one officer, 182 meals, \$91. Referred to committee on claims.

Mr. Thompson presented the financial report of Millard County. Referred.

Mr. Murdock presented a petition

of J. R. Wilkins, clerk of the Second District Court, with a statement of his account, asking for an appropriation of \$100 to purchase record books for the ensuing two years. Referred to the committee on claims and appropriations.

Mr. Thompson presented the petition of Nephi Pratt and 100 others asking to amend the charter of Fillmore City, with accompanying bill. Referred to the committee on municipal corporations and townsites.

Mr. Smith presented (H. F. No. 7) "A bill for an Act to create San Juan County." Read the first time and referred to the committee on counties.

Mr. Penrose presented (H. F. No. 8) a bill for an act for the re-arrangement of the First and Third Judicial Districts. Read the first time and referred to the committee on judiciary, with instructions to print.

Mr. Farr presented petitions of citizens residing in the northern part of the Third Judicial District, asking that the counties of Cache, Box Elder, Morgan, Rich and Weber be created a Judicial District of the Territory, or that said counties be attached to the first Judicial District. Referred to the committee on judiciary.

Mr. Farr presented (H. F. No. 9), A bill for an act amending section 1274 Compiled Laws of Utah. Read the first time and referred to committee on judiciary.

Mr. Thompson presented (H. F. No. 10), A bill for an act amending section 1160 Compiled Laws of Utah Territory. Read the first time and referred to committee on judiciary.

Mr. Pack presented H. F. No. 11, "A bill for an act to repeal section 72 of the Compiled Laws of Utah Territory." Read the first time and referred to the committee on agriculture, etc.

Mr. Pack moved that the judiciary committee be instructed to ascertain if legislation is necessary to secure witnesses for services when summoned to testify on the part of the defence in criminal cases, and if so found to prepare a bill for its accomplishment; carried.
