ogden, March 20.-Edwin Williams, was the unanimous choice of the city council last evening to succeed Fred W. Chambers as councilman from the Fourth ward. This action was taken. after the notice of the removal from office of Mr. Chambers received from the district court had been taken from the table and filed and a resolution passed to proceed with the appointment. Previous to the public session the council met in caucus and decided upon naming Mr. Williams to fill the vacancy. In consequence the names of the other candidates were not presented.

This was due to the fact that since the re-moval of Mr. Chambers, the committee was not complete. A communication from Mayor Conroy recommending the purchase of four, in-stead of two, sprinkling wagons, was referred to the water committee.
