Potomac Poisoning.—Henry C. Mayford, a steamfitter at the Navy Yard, was taken to the emergency hospital last night suffering from potomac poisoning. He arrived in the city last evening, going to a restaurant where he ate canned beans. This food is believed to have been the cause of the poisoning.

Overcome by Heat.—Joshua H. Smith, a G. A. R. veteran aged 62 years, and whose home is at Salem, Or., succumbed yesterday afternoon to the heat and the severe physical strain which the veterans have been placed under during the past few days, and was removed to the emergency hospital in the Boston block. He recovered sufficiently last night to be taken to his room at 270 east Third South street. Mr. Smith enlisted in the Fourth light artillery at Dayton, Mo., in 1861 and served until 1865.

Veteran Assaulted.—It has been reported that on Wednesday night Joseph Hessemler of San Francisco, and a member of George H. Thomas post No. 3, was assaulted in the Vienna bakery on Third South street, by a water who struck the old veteran over the head with a ketchup bottle, knocking him to the floor. It is said that the veteran, who was in the restaurant with his wife, remonstrated with the water who in sweeping the floor raised considerable dust. The water became abusive and in his anger struck the old man with the bottle.

MISMATED MOORES.

Mrs. Cecelia A. Moore brought suit yesterday in the Third district court for separate maintenance against her husband, Reddick R. Moore, chief assistant superintendent of the American Smelting company at Garfield. In her complaint she makes a number of sensational charges. For more than two years she says her husband refused to support her. When she called on him and asked him for money on one occasion he choked her and might have killed her, she says. A third person had not interfered. Mrs. Moore asks the court for an allowance of \$100 a month and \$150 attorney fees. They were married in St. Paul, Tex., Jan. 27, 1902, but have no children. For some time she has been ill and unable to earn a living for herself. On account of Moore's violent temper, she says, she would be afraid to live with him again. Besides his salary of \$300 a month, he had considerable property in Mexico.
