**Death of Harriet B. Clark**—Mrs. Harriet B. Clark, widow of R. W. Clark one of the early pioneers, died last evening, at the Barclay street residence of her son, George W. Clark, at the age of 73, after being an invalid for some years. The deceased was a native of Milton, Pa. and came to Salt Lake in the hands of his wife.

**Raleigh Services Notice**—Jake T. Raleigh, street supervisor and waterman, who has had a fatal pulmonary affection has notified the teamsters and haulers in the city that the wide-tire ordinance would go into effect on Saturday May 8, and that any and all offenders would be prosecuted. **CALL MADE ON BANKS.**

National Monetary Commission Wants To Know Their Conditions.

Charles S. Tingey, secretary of state, issued a call yesterday on all banks and trust companies of the city for a report of their financial condition on the close of business on Wednesday, April 28. The call is made at the request of the national monetary commission created by Congress May 30, 1908. This commission is attempting to secure simultaneous reports from banks and trust companies all over the country. The date is to show the amount of money held in the aggregate by all these institutions at the stated time and the losses sustained.

The controller of currency here has assured statements from national banks but there was no complete or general report from similar institutions.
