NEW YORK, 13. The Tribune says that Florida, Louisiana, Colorado and Nevada are States which have neglected to pass laws specifically providing for filling the vacancies occurring in the electoral college.

The Herald's editorial says the American people are now passing through one of the great straits to which the national character is subjected under all forms of government, and which tests the fitness of a people for their institutions, and them to the circumstances of people.

PARIS, 9.—The Temps publishes a telegram from Vienna, which states that Montenegro, finding herself incapable of maintaining the troops in their present position during the armistice, has opened direct negotiations with the Porte for a prompt conclusion of peace.

BOMBAY, 9.—The Times of India announces that relief works have been established in Sholapore district, where the Pioneer, on the 6th inst., reported that there were prospects of a famine, and 45,000 of the inhabitants have been given employment.

LONDON, 10.—The Post says an arrangement has been reached by the masters and operative cotton spinners of Blackburn by which the threatened great lockout is avoided.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 10.—The Porte has not yet replied to England's conference proposal.

PARIS, 10.—The Count of Chandordy has been appointed French delegate to the Conference of the Powers on the Eastern question.

LONDON, 10.—A telegram from Cairo reports that the Egyptian Minister of Finance has been dismissed and imprisoned for conspiring against Khedive Hussien.

VERSAILLES, 10.—The minister of commerce announced in the Chamber of Deputies, this afternoon, that Mr. Washburn, the American Minister, had declared himself satisfied with M. De Sommerard's disclaimer of the authorship of the letter slandering the people of the United States.

BELGRADE, 10.—A dispatch to the Daily News says a Captain Brown, of Chicago, has received the Serbian Gold Cross for gallantry in the battle of Axiatz, where he lost his leg.

LONDON, 9.—Sir Thomas White was, to-day, installed as Lord Mayor of London with the usual ceremonies. A grand banquet was given by the new Lord Mayor to-night at the Mansion House.

CLEVELAND, O., 13.—Corneilus H. Crall, freight conductor on the C. C. & I., was shot by tramps at Shelby, Ohio, yesterday.

CHICAGO, 13.—Senator John A. Logan has declined to accept the

invitation to make one of the party which is to visit New Orleans, believing that there would be an impropriety in his doing so, since the matter of the Louisiana vote will probably come before the United States Senate.

WASHINGTON, 13. The President to-day signed a pardon for Wm. O. Avery, now confined in the penitentiary at Jefferson City, Mo., for complicity in the whiskey frauds.

CALCUTTA, 9.—The District of Backrunge was ravaged by a cyclone on Tuesday last. A thousand native houses were destroyed, and the town of Dowluttkan was submerged by waves, and 5,000 persons are believed to have perished.
