WASHINGTON, 24.—The wheat and

corn prospects, according to the depart-

ment of agriculture, are not flattering

for the country generally. The acre-

age appears to have been somewhat in-

creased, but the crop will not increase

in proportion to the increase in acre-

age, the chief of which is a dry

spring in most parts of the country.

The largest increase in acreage of wheat

is reported from Kansas, where it is

thirty per cent. greater than last year.

The report on the whole is not specu-

lating, except as failing to

show such an increase in product over

the years as might be expected.
