FLOATING DRYDOCK DEWEY'S LONG VOYAGE.

Washington, Dec. 28 .- When the big floating drydock Dewey today fishes up the last one of her eight 10,000 pound mushroom anchors and starts off down Chesapeake Bay, from Solomon's Is-land bound on a 14,000 mile cruise to the Philippines, she will be the subject of the deepest concern to the navy department and to every American sailor until she safely drops those anchors in the quiet waters of Subig bay, for many naval officers say they are really very doubtful whether the trip can be made in safety. boston, Dec. 2. The American board of commissioners for foreign missions in its ninety-fifth report, made public to-day, deals with conditions in Turkey. It states that the political situation in the western Turkey mission, which includes Constantinople, has been favorable. While there have been no little terrorizing in the Calonica field of the European Turkey mission, and a spirit of revolution in parts of Bulgaria, fear of war or of a general massacre of Christians has not been acute. A significant event of the year was the gift of 200 france gold, from Prince Fer-dinand of Bulgaria for repairs upon the mission church at Sofia. "The greatest unrest has been in the Yan and Bitliss fields, eastern Turkey," the report says, "where bands of revo-lutionists organising in Russia have at-tacked Turkish villages and clashed with Turkish troops. Poverty and suffering in these two stations especially have been severe. The missionaries have adminis-tered relief funds sent from the United States, England and Germany, and the regular work has gone on with but ilitle permanent interruption. The government has thrown many obstacles in the way of missionary travel. Evidently orders have been sent out into the districts from Constantinopie to greven the missionaries from traveling in the country." The troubles of the government in Ara-bia, calling out the reserves and increas-ing the taxes have created unrest among al classes. Emigration of Armenians to the United States is a direct bindrance to the work, in that many of the trained teachers and Christian workers are among the number.

Several members of the church have suffered imprisonment from the alleged false charges of the Turkish government. government.
