

DIAZ OF MEXICO RIGHTS HIMSELF

Repudiates Statement He Fav-
ored Central American
Federation.

ASKS A. P. TO CORRECT IT.

"Or," He Declares, "It Would Seem to
The World That the President
Of Mexico Was a Fool."

City of Mexico, May 14.—At a late
hour tonight United States Ambassador
Thompson was seen at his home in re-
gard to the interview accorded to
President Diaz printed in New York
Ambassador Thompson said:

"At this interview between President
Diaz and Mr. Miner, a representative of
the New York Herald, President Diaz
did not say that he favored a federa-
tion of the Central American states
with the United States and Mexico as
joint guarantors, and no such thing was
translated from the president to Mr.
Miner by the official interpreter of the
embassy, who acted as interpreter on
the occasion."

The representative of the Associated
Press was received in special audience
by President Diaz, and his attention
being called to a telegram from New
York saying that he favored a federa-
tion of the Central American states with
the United States and Mexico as joint
guarantors, he said that he had made such
a statement to any newspaper man, adding
that he hoped that the Associated
Press would correct the same or, "It
would seem to the world that the president
of Mexico was a fool."

He said that last Saturday the Ameri-
can ambassador, David E. Thompson,
called upon him with two gentlemen,
both Americans, one a mining man in
northern Mexico and the other a repre-
sentative of a New York newspaper.
They were accompanied by some one
who acted as interpreter, and President
Diaz declared that the statement con-
cerning the federation and the protec-
torate of the Central American states
was without doubt a mistake in transla-
tion made by this interpreter.

The president today stated that in
the interview of last Saturday he had
told his interviewers that Mexico would
never go to war with Guatemala unless
there was some strong reason for
making war necessary, and even
these reasons would have to be
such as would appeal to the nations of
the world; but, on the other hand,
Mexico would tolerate and slight
from Guatemala or any other nation.
He added in his conversation to the
gentlemen last Sunday that the extra-
dition of the Guatemalan minister from
Guatemala was because of their impli-
cation in an act of assassination in this
city. Guatemala, he said, excused her-
self under the treaty existing between
Mexico and that country, but the excuse
was scarcely valid.

He then reviewed the incidents re-
lating to the controversy and the re-
moval of the Mexican minister from
Guatemala to the capital of Salvador.
"We wish to avoid any further slight
or act of discourtesy to our diplomatic
representatives," said President Diaz.
"Had any such occurred, the temper
of the Mexican people would have been
roused to such a point that trouble
would have arisen between the two
countries."

The president says that this move
was temporary, and he trusted that the
better sense of the people of Guatemala
would prevail and that the relations
between the two countries would re-
sume their former condition of stability
and mutual regard.

GUTHRIE MURDER CASE.

Coroner's Jury Says George Melville
Deliberately Committed the Deed.

Helena, Mont., May 14.—The coroner's
jury which investigated the death of
Winifred C. Guthrie at a small mining
camp near here Sunday, has rendered
verdict to the effect that the deed was
committed by George Melville and that
it was an act of deliberation. In con-
sequence, County Atty. Heywood an-
nounced his intention of filing an in-
formation charging first degree murder.
Melville in an interview at the county
jail admitted the killing and said it

The Melvilles figured in a sensational
affair at Butte last year, the wife being
arrested on a bigamy charge. It being
alleged that while still the wife of
Melville, she had married a man named
Northley. While his wife was in jail
on this charge Melville was arrested
for unlawful cohabitation. The affair
was straightened up by Northey serving
a divorce and Melville serving a
30-day sentence.

Mrs. Melville, when 14 years old,
eloped from Wallace, Idaho, with a man
named Walbridge. The latter was ar-
rested on a statutory charge because of
her years, but married her and secured
his release. With her father, William
Hunter, they started for Montana,
and while hunting in Granite coun-
ty, Walbridge disappeared. Later
Walbridge's body was found, and upon
circumstantial evidence and that of his
daughter, Hunter was given a life sen-
tence.

RESTORED TO PUBLIC DOMAIN.

Washington, May 14.—Lands heretofore
withdrawn from entry by order of
the president for forest reserva-
tion purposes have been restored to
the public domain as follows: One
hundred and twenty-nine thousand
two hundred and eighty acres in the
San Jacinto forest, California; 988,
560 acres in the Rainier and 268,000
acres in the Washington forest, Wash-
ington; 65,840 acres in the Cascade
forest and 122,000 in the Hesper forest,
Oregon; 244,980 acres in the
Medicine Bow forest, Wyoming.

FORTUNES MADE IN WHEAT.

Chicago, May 14.—Many men got

ble by yesterday's extraordinary bull

City, Dallas, Lincoln and Oklahoma
City.

MURDERER CONFESSES CRIME.

Omaha, May 14.—Phillip Burke,
who was arrested at Hooper, this
afternoon, charged with being the
murderer of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Cop-
ple, near Rosalie, Thurston county,
yesterday, tonight made a confession
of his crime.

Burke said his real name was Louis
Ray Higgins, but he went by the
name of Burke. He said he was un-
able to remember the details of the
crime because he was mad from
whisky when he committed the crime.
He asked Sheriff Bateman to notify
his mother, who he said is Cora Ray
Higgins of Leavitt.

STRIKE ON THE ISTHMUS.

Steam Shovel Workers Demand Three
Hundred Dollars a Month.

Panama, May 14.—The strike of the
steam shovel workers which began
yesterday, the men demanding
\$200 per month instead of their present
salary of \$120, continues today.
This morning only eight men
shovels were at work. Col. Goethals,
the chief engineer, is endeavoring to
replace the strikers with mechanics
now employed in the shops, and it is
reported that he has sent a cable-
gram to Jackson Smith, the member
of the canal commission in charge
of the labor, to contract for engineers
in the United States.

The steam shovelers on strike will
go to Colon this afternoon and it is
reported that they have chartered a
German tramp steamer to convey them
north.

COULDN'T ROLL CIGARETTE.

So Young Girl in Man's Attire Was
Placed Under Arrest.

Chicago, May 14.—A dispatch to the
Record-Herald from St. Louis says
because Miss Minnie Block, aged 21, can-
not roll a cigarette like a man she now
is in the city jail. While in black and
male attire, she was arrested yesterday
while downtown thoroughfare with Ed. For-
rest, a man whom she has "hoaxed" her
way from Mead, Kan., her home, to St.
Louis, and with whom she intended to
Washington to the way in which
she reached this city.

Miss Mead, wearing Forrest's big shoes
to more effectively disguise herself, wan-
dered about the streets for several hours
until finally detectives saw her attempt-
ing to make a cigarette of material hand-
ed her by Forrest, and deciding she was

He says he was awarded a lower medal

lyn, went out of commission yesterday,
when her flag was lowered and Lieu-
tenant Commander M. Stone turned the craft
over to the department of construction
and repair.

STRIKERS SEE GOV. MAGOON.

Havana, May 15.—The striking cig-
ar makers called on Gov. Magoon
yesterday and said that the blame for
the men remaining out lay with the
manufacturers, who had declared a
lockout against them. The men desired
to return to work if the employers de-
sired them to do so. Women, it is
said, will be put in place of the strik-
ing men. Thus far there have been
no disturbances.

LUKE'S METHODS BRANDED LEGAL

Wins in the Supreme Court.

Judge Stroup Thursday granted a
writ of prohibition, the other Judges
concurring, against Judge Lewis from
assuming jurisdiction in the case of
Jacob Pratt and others against Wil-
liam Hendrickson, on appeal to the
District Court from the Justice's
Court.

In granting the writ an opinion was
expressed that a notice of an intention
on an undertaking of an appeal is not
a notice of an undertaking of an ap-
peal being filed and does not come
within the statutes.

After judgment had been secured in
this case in the Justice's Court the ap-<
