OGDEN, UTAH. - Dec. 12, 1905.

Fourth District Court.

On Monday M. T. Olin, who was arrested in October last, charged with committing adultery with his 15-year-old step-daughter, was placed on trial. The little girl would not testify against him, but said she was with him during the whole time she was with the witness.

The case was continued in the afternoon, and resulted in the jury returning a verdict of not guilty. Olin, who has been in the penitentiary since first arrested, was held further on a charge of rape. This case was continued until the end of the term, and he doubtless will be returned to the pen.

Two cases of unlawful cohabitation were disposed of. William J. Ormrod pleaded guilty, and was sentenced by Judge Miller to three months imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$100. Frederick Yates pleaded not guilty, and several witnesses were examined, after which the judge instructed the jury to return a verdict of not guilty, which was accordingly done.

A. H. Nelson, charged with embezzlement, was arraigned and given his Tuesday to plead.

The execution of the estate of Peter L. Anderson brought suit to recover from David A. Nelson, J. H. Nelson and H. J. Williams judgment on notes aggregating \$2,419, with \$200 attorney's fees.

The case of Joseph Barton, an officer in the Pacific Coast and Investment company, charged with violating the canal laws, was argued, submitted and taken under advisement by the court. Several minor cases were disposed of.

The Railroad Wreck.

Owing to a broken wheel, the freight train due in Ogden on Sunday morning last was wrecked in Echo canyon with descending grade hill just above Echo. Several freight cars, laden with Midwinter Fair exhibits, oil, whisky and general merchandise, were derailed, and the interlocking mass after being caught fire and burned until the greater part was completely destroyed. A temporary track was constructed around the wreck by a force of men sent out for the purpose, and the passenger and freight traffic from this city east was on Monday transferred over the Oregon Short Line. Fortunately no person was injured in the wreck. This morning the train just over the Union Pacific as usual.

Notes.

On Friday of this week, the Retail societies and Young Ladies' association held their conjoint conference in the Ogden Tabernacle, with meetings at 7 a. m. and 2 p. m. It is expected that President Willard Woodruff will be present to address the congregation.

The Hawaiian Minister Thurston and the editor of the Honolulu Advertiser, James H. McGowan, arrived in Ogden via McCammon and Cache Valley, on Monday, on their way to the coast.

Arrangements are being made to entertain the Conductors' Mutual Aid society which will arrive here on Wednesday. The city and chamber of commerce will take the initiative, and the citizens are asked to help.

Higgins, in connection with the matter, and would probably be called in account by his brother as a doing.
