Prominent Men's Opinions Regarding the Situation.

A PECULIAR DAMAGE SUIT.

The Gold in the Treasury steadily increasing.—The Commander of the Scottish Rite Ill.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—Among the opinions obtained regarding the situation as affected by the action of the Scottish Rite government are as follows: Representative Chase says he is hopeful of a speedy settlement of the question when Congress meets. He thinks the most logical and common sense thing will be to repeat the same law and the law levying the 10 per cent tax on state bank currency and provide for the free coinage of silver at such a rate to place it at parity with gold.

A. J. Warner, of Ohio, president of the American bimetallic league said:

"The stopping of the coinage of silver in India inaugurates a new monetary revolution. It is a movement designed and will be far-reaching in its consequences. The closing of the mints of India and China is a part of a gigantic conspiracy to seize upon the present opportunity to finally and forever settle the silver question at a standard to be set over the world. The immediate consequences will be that silver will fall and gold will increase in value far more than ever. Prices will fall everywhere as gold rises. Every advantage will be in the hands of the creditor nations. England has not only to subsidize the world with arms but with gold."

"What is there left to do but for the western countries, and the United States, to unite and act independently, and establish a financial system founded upon equity and calculated to secure stability in value, and one which will keep an even balance between the debtor and creditor, and not be calculated to ruin this country by the debt for the benefit of the creditor?"

The national convention of the American Bimetallic League has just adjourned after the closing of the session of the league in the city of Chicago.

Secretary Corbin, in response to a request to express his views on the financial situation, said that the action of India on silver, politically considered, was not a step in the direction of a monetary revolution, but a step in the direction of a monetary crisis.

HOW BOND WAS DAMAGED.

John C. Bond is plaintiff in a suit commenced in the circuit court today against Mrs. Josephine A. Allen, formerly of Portland, Ore., and now of Chicago, and her husband, Elton W. Allen. It is claimed that the defendant by word of mouth and letters within were instrumental in preventing the plaintiff from receiving the proceeds of the World's Fair grounds. A result of the suit is a monetary loss by failing to secure the position and the defendant's good name suffered thereby to the extent of \$20,000.

BANK EXAMINER APPOINTED.

Comptroller Fisher today appointed Charles A. Dyer, of Fort Townsend, Wash., national bank examiner and assigned him to take charge of the failed First National Bank at Fort Angeles, Wash.

WARRANTED BY THE STATE.

Dr. James C. Hatch, who succeeded the late General Albert Pike as commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, is being dangerously ill in this city, suffering from a severe attack of pneumonia. He is thought, with consumption, to have been suffering from the disease since last April. He is growing gradually weaker, and while he may last weeks, his death may occur at any moment.

GOLD IN THE TREASURY.

Since June 10th the treasury department has gained \$1,100,544 in gold, the total gold today being \$55,000,000.

CONVICTS AND GUARDS.

Prisoners Fight for Liberty and Meat.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 27.—The Young Men's Prison special, received at 12:30 this afternoon a gang of convicts employed in the upper quarry next to the head of the river, who, claiming to be the prisoners of the state, were taken to the city and held in the city of Sacramento.

A meeting of the Amenity and Prisoner Aid association will be held tomorrow evening to raise a fund to be used in establishing the three prisoners in the city.

DENVER SHELTERS.

Effect of the Fall in the Price of Silver.

DENVER, June 27.—The Denver sheltered very severely the drop in silver. They have an income of about \$50,000,000, enough to last for several months without making new contracts, but the trouble is that there is a tendency to make silver, and if the shelterers cannot dispose of the products of their work, it will be an impossibility to continue running.
