KUROPATKIN HAS A HARD TIME.

While He is Fighting the Japanese He is Being Fought at St. Petersburg.

CZAR SAID TO BE DISSATISFIED.

Would Dismiss Him and Alexieff Were it Not for Fear of Public Opinion.

London, May 31 .- The reports published in Paris of discord in the interview between Gen. Kuropatkin and Viceroy Alexieff at Mukden and the southern movement of the Russian vanguard below Wafengtien have given rise to rumors that Gen. Kuropatkin has yielded to the wishes of the Alexieff party and is attempting to relieve Port Arthur, Among sober papers here, however, the idea that Gen. Kuropatkin would venture on such a dangerous and hopeless movement is not to be taken seriously.

Gen. Kuropatkin, the Telegraph's St. Petersburg correspondent says, is fighting two enemies, one at home, the other in Manchurla. While his military reputation is undergoing a terrible ordeal, he is also accused of failure, as minister of war, to make the proper representations for war. The emperor is preparations for war. The emperor is alleged to be so dissatisfied that he would dismiss both Alexieff and Kurowould dismiss both Alexieff and Kuropatkin were it not that he fears the effect on public opinion. The general impression among the highest classes is that the fall of Port Arthur ought to connote the end of the war and that if the Japanese should succeed in this aim Russia's best interest would be to make peace, but nobody, the correspondent avers, possesses the moral courage to make such a suggestion to the emperor.

The correspondent also asserts that The correspondent also asserts that an agreement is drafted whereby Germany promises armed support to Russia if necessary, to prevent England and the United States from attempting to submit the far eastern question to an international congress, and declares that the recent relaxation of anti-Jewish laws by Russia is the outcome of the desire of the minister of the interior to concillate American opinion.

RUSSIANS ARE NERVOUS. War Will Lay Bare Many Defects in Their Government.

St. Petersburg, May 20, 3:40 p. m.—The Novre Vremya, invelghing against the nervousness produced by the latest news,

nervousness produced by the latest news, says;

"The war will lay bare many defects in our life and administrative and political mechanism, and must have its useful consequences if it shows up weak spots and directs attention to them. But the Russians must not allow themselves to become the prey of depression. In war the stronger always wins in the end. We should not be downesst at the latest news of the success of the weaker side, which is enjoying temporary numerical superiority."

The Russky Invalid believes the Japan-ese have formed a new base between Pitsewo and Cape Terminal, Liao Tung peinsula, in conjunction with their depots on the Elliet Islands, with the intention of making further disembarkments in connection with the operations against Port Arthur.

London, May 31 .- The attack on Port arthur, the Chronicle's Tokio correspondent telegraphs, is expected to begin here June 15. Correspondents will leave here June 10 in time to see the capture, probably about June 20. The correspondent also says 10,000 Russians have been sent up the Liao river in tunks to Tie Lung.

Philadelphia, May 30 .- A race riot between white and colored persons occurred at Thirtieth and Wharton streets late this afternoon, and before the police succeeded in quelling the disturbance five persons were seriously hurt and a score of others were more or less roughly handled. Those most seriously injured, who were taken to a hospital, are:

Irene Mentez, aged 6 years; shot in the back. Jesse Waller (colored), 28 years; stabbed in the back.

Robert McCollough, 30 years shot in the back.

Lizzie Langdon, 18 years; shot in left Policeman Albert Gibson, badly cut

on head and possible fracture of skull. on head and possible fracture of skull. The police have not yet ascertained the direct cause of the trouble. At any rate, a fight was started between white and colored children in which their elders became involved. Bricks and other missiles were seen flying through the air. The mob grew larger, and finally clubs and pistols were brought into play. A squad of policemen from a near-by stationhouse was quickly on the scene and put an end to the disturbance. Eleven persons charged with assault and battery and inciting to riot were arrested.

FIRE REVEALS A MYSTERY. Beautiful White Child Burned to

Death in a Negress' Hut.

New York, May 31.—A small fire which destroyed a negro hovel in Brooklyn has disclosed to the police a strange case of hidden identity. In the fire which destroyed the building a beautiful white child 8 years old, lost her life.

Her presence in the hut which had been occupied by an old negress for some years caused an investigation, t was learned that the child had been reared by the negress and had al-though evidently of refined parentage, been compelled to grow up without education and find her playmates among the negro children of the neighborhood. In some manner the girl had been slightly crippled. Fragmentary admissions by the ne-

Fragmentary admissions by the negress lead to the belief that the child's mother was a young woman well known in Brooklyn society. Its foster mother said she received for a time \$500 every 12 months to care for the little girl but that payments stopped five years ago, and owing to her attachment for the little one, she went to work in order to provide for it. She was absent when the house was burned. Thus far all efforts to unseal the woman's lips and disclose the secret of the child's identity have failed.

FOUR PLUNGED TO THEIR DEATH.

Were Throwing Flowers Into the River in Memory of the Dead When Bridge Broke.

OTHERS NARROWLY ESCAPED.

Accident Occurred at Salida, Colo., And Was Witnessed by Thousands.

Salida, Colo., May 30 .- While the memorial exercises were at their height today and the veterans were casting flowers on the waters of the Arkansas river in memory of the heroic dead, four people were suddenly plunged to death by the breaking of a foot bridge spanning the river ut the lower edge of Riverside park. A number of others were thrown into the stream, several of whom are missing. The rest narrow-ly escaped with their lives. The acci-dent was witnessed by 1,000 persons, ho seemed powerless to render assist-

KNOWN DEAD.

The people who witnessed the accident declare there were 20 persons on the bridge at the time of the collapse. The river is about 40 feet wide at the point where the bridge broke, about 10 feet deep and has a very powerful current. The stream suddenly appeared to be filled with struggling humanity and an indescribable scream of horror went up from the crowd.

Men with ropes and pulleys went to work quickly, clearing the wreckage and saving lives. Others in buggles and on horseback started down the river, bent on the work of rescue. They have since been patrolling the stream for many miles below the city, searching for the missing bodies. A wire netting has been stretched across the river at Wellsville, six miles below Salida, in the hope that the bodies will be swept into it tonight.

A report is in circulation tonight that the body of Mrs. Tompkins has been seen lodged on a rock several miles below the city, but this cannot be verified. It will require several days before it is definitely known how many lives were lost.

DEATH TO BOLL WEEVILS. Red Ants Kill All in a Vast Texas Cotton Field.

Fort Worth, Texas, May 31.—A special to the Record from San Antonio, Texas, says: Jose Cassiano, ex-county collector, who has several hundred acres of cotton in this county, is the bearer of the glad tidings concerning the work of red ants. Mr. Cassiano's Mr. Cassiano fields less than a mouth ago were alive with boll weevils. Today he said that there was not a live weevil in his fields. The rows are strewn with dead weevils which the busy little red ants are carrying away by thousands. Mr. Cassiano says a close inspection failed to show a single live weevil on a cotton plant any where in his field. The ants are on the plants and in the rows between in countless thousands. They seem to have completed the slaughter of the weevils and are now engaged in carry-ing the corpses away probably to be stored for food.

Chinese Refugees from Dalny.

Chefoo, May 31 (2:45 p. m.),—One hundred Chinese refugees arrived here from Dalny and Tallenwan, While their statements differ in many respects regarding existing conditions on the Liao Tung peninsula, the majority agree up-on the point that the Russians had left both places before the Russians had left both places before the Junks sailed on the 28th instant. Upon evacuation by the Russians, bandits attacked both towns and commenced burning and pil-laging. The Japanese arrived later and took steps to protect the Chinese mer-chants. One Russian official was killed by the bandits. The Japanese troops captured the naval guns taken from Port Arthur to Nan Shan hill.

Gen. Ma's Troops Reviewed.

New York, May 31 .- A review of New York, May 31.—A review of Gen. Ma's troops has taken place at Ping Chung, says a Herald dispatch from Pekin. There were 3,000 infantry, 5,000 cavalry, 20 light mounted guns and four 3-inch Krupp guns. The infantry is fair.
