THE CAUSE OF DEATH.

How Orson Pratt Seegmiller Musser Was Fatally Injured.

In memory of Orson Pratt Seegmiller

Musser, the facts surrounding his early death are here recorded. The numerous friends of A. Milton Musser and wife, Anna S. Musser, were grieved to learn of the sudden death of their sob, Orson, on Monday, July 10, at 2:15 a. m. The young man was born July 18, 1886, under circumstances of the most

1886, under circumstances of the most distressing character during the flercest period of the anti-"Mormon" raid. He was his mother's youngest son, and had he lived until Tuesday next, would have been 19 years of age. On Saturday, the 8th, at 8 p. m., he was in the employ of D. R. Hammond at Honeyville, Boxelder county. While it was not thought at the time his injuries were

bright at the time his injuries were serious, his parents were immediately notified, and his mother at once went to his bedside. He did not suffer and talked pleasantly with those about him, but a little after midnight he quietly and unexpectedly passed away on Monday morning at 2:15. The was a young man of great prom-ise. He was physically of a handsome appearance, genial in his personality, intelligent, sweet, and companionable From his youth, he had observed the laws of life and health, but in such a manner as to not make his devotion to these precepts of the Gospel noticeable.
