Sunday, July 27th. 1794—Robesplerre, the terrible French revolutionist, was overthrown. 1837—Joseph Smith, Jr., was persecut-ed with a vexatious lawsuit, at Painesville, Ohio. Monday, 28th.

794—Robespierre, of France, and 22 other leading revolutionists were killed in Paris. 830—A revolution which finally brought Louis Phillippe on the French throne broke out.

1847—The sick detachment of the Mor-mon Battalion, under Capt. James Brown, who had wintered at Pueblo, arrived in the camp of the Ploneers in G. S. L. Valley.

837—Nine persons were baptized in the river Ribble, near Preston, Eng-land, as the first fruit of preaching the Gospel in that land. George D. Watt was the first one baptized.
1844—Samuel H. Smith, brother of the martyred Prophet and Patriarch, died at Nauvoo, III.

1556-Ignatius Loyola, founder of the Jesuits, died in Rome; he was born 1491, in Spain.

1346-The main portion of the Mormon Battalion arrived at Fort Leavenworth.
