CORRESPONDENCE.

KIRTLAND, Ohio, November 12, 1877.

The anniversary of my departure from home found me an inhabitant of the little village of Kirtland, one of the scenes of historic interest so closely connected with the career of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Some near relatives, with whom I am staying, yet remain in the neighborhood, and the little graveyard on the hill is the final resting place of many more.

The village is small and scattering, the population corresponding to the appearance of the scene, suggesting the idea that it had withered away, while the spiritual condition, if judged from the multiplicity of its creeds and opinions, is a fair example of confusion.

The people, as a rule, are kind-hearted and social, but quite oblivious to the sound of the gospel.

Nearly every one I meet has some "time remaining" to be given to a "blood-curdling account of "Mormon atrocities" in early days, or something equally false and ridiculous, and seem surprised and injured at the least display of incredulity.

By the courtesy of the trustees of the Town Hall I was enabled to leave an appointment for the evening of the 29th ult., and notwithstanding his expressed conviction that there would be but a poor turnout, was pleased to find and address a considerable audience.

His address was clearly one of courage and conviction, and in the hearing of several gentlemen came forward, and after introducing themselves, requested me to speak.

The subject of polygamy in Utah was the one that would best satisfy the minds of the people. I told them it would hold another meeting with pleasure if I could have the hall.
