LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.—Brother William Hopwood, an employee of the grocery department of Z. C. M. I., accidentally shot himself through the hand today. THE LEGISLATURE.—Yesterday the following was received from Hon. George Black, secretary of the Territory of Utah:

To the Honorable President of the Council of the Territory of Utah:

Sir—I have the honor to inform you that I have secured rooms in which to hold the "Twentieth" session of the "Legislative Assembly," in the room above the Eagle Tavern, South street, between East Temple and First East streets.

I have spared neither pains nor expense in making them pleasant and comfortable, and am glad to report that everything is now in readiness for your reception, and would ask that all your attention and convenience will adjourn to the place provided.

I have also the honor to submit the following copies of instructions received by me from Washington:

Sir.—The appropriation for legislative and other expenses of the Territory for the current year is \$20,000. You will keep the expenditure with the amount and in our no liability in excess of it.

In making arrangements for printing the journals of the Legislature, you can secure greater economy by having the printing done whenever and as often as convenient, as has accumulated to make eight volumes.

You will not have inserted in the journals any reports or documents except the governor's message.

For printing the message in pamphlet form you will pay for one composition only.

Reports of Territorial officers may be printed if desired by the Legislature, but the cost, including paper and binding, must be paid by the Territory. It will not be allowed in your accounts.
