

## W. D. HAYWOOD AS A FAILURE

Said Lecture Tour Made No  
Friends for Miners or  
Socialist Converts.

### LACKS PARTY ASSISTANCE.

Officially Stated That He Is Dropped  
From the Pay Roll of the  
Western Federation.

The official announcement that William D. Haywood had been dropped from the pay roll of the Western Federation of Miners and that he no longer represented that organization in any capacity brought out the statement yesterday that his lecture tour throughout the east proved a flat failure and neither made friends for the Western Federation of Miners nor converts to the Socialist party, says the Chicago Record-Herald.

While Haywood was removed as secretary of the Western Federation last December, the executive board gave him permission to use the name of the organization in soliciting funds on his lecture tour. He was delegated to represent the organization at the convention of the United Mineworkers at In-

diapolis six weeks ago and was again commissioned to visit the convention of the Illinois miners at Springfield two weeks ago.

While acting in that capacity he was paid by the organization, but has not been regularly on the pay roll since last December.

**PARTY PA'S NO EXPENSE.**  
It was generally supposed that the National Socialist party was paying some part of Haywood's expenses while he was lecturing in the east, but that was denied yesterday by Secy. J. Mahon Barnes. Barnes said that the National Socialist party had not assigned Haywood to make a single speech or paid him any money.

The announcement of Haywood's removal is contained in this week's issue of the Miners' Magazine. It is printed in big black type and reads:

**TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:**  
This is to inform you that the executive board of the Western Federation of Miners has decided to terminate the services of William D. Haywood as a representative of the Western Federation of Miners in the field, the same to take effect on the 8th day of April, 1908.

**C. E. MAHONEY,**  
Vice President W. F. M.

On the date mentioned both Haywood and Mahoney were in Chicago and to outsiders appeared to be on friendly terms. At that time Mahoney admitted that Haywood was not on the pay roll except when acting as a special representative at conventions. But the removal of Haywood is the culmination of friction that has existed on the executive board for many months and was caused largely, it is said, by some parts of the confession of Harry Orchard. That confession was declared to be as much of a revelation to some of the executive board members as it was to the public, and although it was pretty generally discredited some parts of it have never been explained.

**FRICITION AT TRIAL.**  
During the trial of Haywood at Boise, Ida., last summer for complicity in the murder of Frank Steenberg

there was said to be a great deal of friction between him and the other defendants, Charles H. Moyer and George A. Petibone. The defense tried to keep the matter secret because of the effect it might have on the trial, but it was privately admitted that Haywood was not on speaking terms with the other defendants, although the three occupied the same room during certain portions of the day.

On the acquittal of Haywood he returned to the headquarters in Denver, but would not settle down to the work of the office. He wanted to go on the lecture platform. Atty. Clarence S. Darrow, who defended him in the trial, tried to dissuade him from his purpose and advised him to keep quiet and out of the public eye as much as possible. Haywood took the advice as an insult and abused Mr. Darrow. Since then they have not spoken to each other.

When the executive board removed Haywood from the secretaryship in December after repeated warnings, they did not wish to have it made public, and to all inquiries it was said he had been granted a leave of absence.

While Haywood's honesty in the handling of the funds of the organization has never been doubted by anyone, it is said there were many unnecessary expenditures during his tenure of office that did not suit the other members of the executive board. In some instances personal threats had to be made against the board members to have them approve of the reports of Haywood.

The organization has during the last five years had representatives in the field in the east soliciting funds most of the time. According to the claims of the officers, the Western Federation of Miners has a membership of about 40,000. That is almost equal to the membership of International Typographical union, which expended more than \$1,000,000 in its fight for the eight-hour day and raised the amount almost wholly within its own membership.

At the time that unions in the east, which are affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, were contributing money to assist the Western Federation

of Miners, its official organ was denouncing Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and other officers as "labor fakirs" and "grifters."

The present officials of the Western Federation of Miners are anxious to overcome the effects of the policies inaugurated by Haywood and it is said that his removal is one step in that direction. The feeling between the unions in the east and the miners' organization is more friendly now than it has been for years, and with Haywood out of office it is said that an affiliation with the American Federation of Labor is probable within a short time.

Haywood will be allowed to retain his membership in the local union at Silver City, Ida., but it is said he will never hold another official position in the national organization. He was first elected a member of the national executive board in 1898, and was elected secretary-treasurer in 1899. He held the position until his arrest in connection with the Steenberg murder in January, 1905.

## SURPRISE SPRUNG IN ABE RUEF CASE

Asst. Dist. Atty. Heney Moved  
Dismissal of Fourteen Indictments Against J. E. Green.

### HIS TESTIMONY WAS WANTED.

On Advice of Counsel Was Reading  
Statement Setting Forth Reason  
Why He Could Not Testify.

San Francisco, May 1.—The prosecution sprung its first surprise in the case of Abraham Ruef, the former political dictator of San Francisco, on trial for bribery, when Asst. Dist. Atty. Francis J. Heney, late this afternoon moved the dismissal of 14 indictments against J. E. Green, president of the Parkside Realty company, a co-defendant of Ruef in the case now being tried, in order that Green might testify against the former political boss.

Green had been called to the stand by the prosecution despite the objection of his attorneys. Judge Dooling directed that he be sworn and after some preliminary questions, the assistant district attorney related what steps he had taken to get the cooperation of the board of supervisors, which had held up a franchise, to take some action.

Green upon advice of his counsel refused to answer, and started to read statement setting forth his reasons. Heney objected to the reading of the statement, which was sustained by the court and Green then upon advice of counsel refused to answer upon the ground that he would be testifying against himself.

Then on behalf of the people a move that all the indictments against the witness, 14 in number, be dismissed, that he may give his testimony in this case," said the assistant district attorney, rising to his feet.

This unexpected move on the part of the prosecution came as a surprise to the defense and created something of a sensation in the crowded courtroom. A whispered consultation between Ruef and his attorneys quickly followed. Chief counsel for the defendant strongly objected to the move of the prosecution on the ground that such an application could only be made upon a joint trial of the co-defendants.

Judge Dooling overruled the objection of the defense, dismissed the indictments against the witness and ordered his discharge therefrom. Green visibly showed his relief and pleasure at the sudden turn of proceedings and smilingly acknowledged his willingness to testify. At this point an adjournment was taken until Monday.

Walter B. Cope, president of the San Francisco Bar association, formerly superior judge of Santa Barbara county and for four years Ruef's classmate in college, testified against Ruef this morning. He is a member of the firm of attorneys for the Parkside Realty company, in which he also was a stockholder, and told of Ruef's demand for a fee of \$40,000 or \$50,000 if employed by the company to get the desired trolley franchise through the board of supervisors. Cope was followed by W. I. Brobeck, who also was jointly indicted with Ruef. Brobeck was questioned about his knowledge of the trolley application.
