

LEADERS AND PARTIES IN JAPAN.

"BENEFICENT are the peacemakers," we are told in the Scriptures, but in the light of recent events in Japan the conclusion is forced upon us that holy writ does not run in the empire of the rising sun, says Stephen Bonsai in the Chicago Record-Herald. The Chinese, who have accumulated considerable wisdom in the 2,000 or 3,000 years in which they have exercised statecraft, have a saying to the contrary effect, that the way of the peacemaker is hard, harder indeed than that of the transgressor, and perhaps Uncle Sam will be forced shortly to accept the Confucian version.

There can be no antagonism between America and Japan if for no other reason than that Baron Kaneko and Takehashi agree on that point. It is to be hoped that no one will doubt the sincerity of these gentlemen, at least one of whom is a Harvard graduate. The Japanese consul in Manila, it is true, furnished arms to the Philippine insurgents (for full particulars see the archives of the general staff in Washington), but was he not immediately replaced by an able official against whom no such breach of comradely decorum and neutrality can be proved? It is also a fact that by the creation of the camphor monopoly and the imposition of vexatious regulations on the tea trade, Japan has killed our once flourishing commerce with Formosa,

but, after all, these are merely facts, and, of course, we are proceeding on the theory of the open door promissory by Baron Kaneko in New York and Takehashi in London.

Who would doubt the disinterestedness of these gentlemen? It is true they may have been raised among us in the approximate \$200,000,000, but that is a side issue and a mere bagatelle after all. Who would suspect these gentlemen of coloring conditions and concealing facts of lying with patriotic purposes? The mere thought is incredible, because, well, because Baron Kaneko is a Harvard graduate, and, as he says, when in Tokyo he lives next door to the emperor.

Baron Kaneko and other distinguished Japanese publicists say that a very great number of their countrymen profess Christianity, and that all without exception date upon Christians. When two weeks ago the mobs in Japan got the upper hand for an hour or two in places as far apart as Kobe and Tokyo they made immediately for Christian temples and destroyed them. Not, of course, because they were places consecrated to our worship, though some superficial persons will say so, but they were objectionable architecturally, and the stoning of Mr. Harriman—not because he was a white man and an American but because the Japanese policyholders of the great company think he has been getting more than his fair share of the Equitable surplus. What mistakes we would make in judging the course of current events in Japan if the mikado in his benevolence had not placed Baron Kaneko in New York and Mr. Takehashi in London to

set us right when inclined to take any but the Japanese point of view? In other words the straight news that has been coming from Japan the last few days is illuminating as well as comforting. To begin with, it shows that the Japanese are human after all, and consequently make mistakes. It is a great mistake for the Tokyo press not to denounce the anti-Christian and anti-foreign attitude of the street mobs, and what could the city fathers of the Japanese capital have been thinking of when by resolution drawn in cold blood, they practically endorsed it? Does it not look in the light of this lapse from reason and common sense that the Japanese went to war with Russia not merely to secure the strategic points necessary to her safety, which are secured by the treaty of Portsmouth, but because she wanted the whole Asiatic main, and bitter has been her awakening?

The peace treaty having become the foothold of Japanese political parties, it would be interesting to point out exactly where they stand and for what they stand, but this is very difficult. There are out there two principal parties around which revolve a number of personal groups, seeking prominence and spoils when the opportunity presents. The progressive party is led by Count Okuma, "the sage of Waseda," who, it is announced, will oppose the ratification of the treaty. Okuma is a bitter fighter, a dynamic bomb in the hands of a political opponent has blown him physically to pieces, but not abated one jot the uncompromising nature and texture of his opinions. For a decade he has been "Russia in the far east must be destroyed," and cruel must have been his awakening when apprised that by the treaty signed on American soil Russia is only crippled.

The most powerful party, and the one most numerously represented in the diet, is the Constitutional party, cre-

ated and really led by the Marquis Ito, though the actual duties of leadership are apparently left to Marquis Sanoji or some other young and useful man. This party, the seiyu-kai, swears by the constitution, which is perhaps the most effective instrument that was ever devised as a palladium of popular rights. Marquis Ito, who is said to have drawn up the instrument with his own hand, chose as his model the Prussian constitution which Bismarck conferred upon Germany, and in putting the provisions of this document into Japanese he left out or weakened those which would seem to affect in however slight measure the supremacy of the monarchial principle.

We are often informed by Japanese statesmen that there is a constitutional country, and that the power to veto is reserved to the people and is an inalienable right. They do not add, however, that the present emperor has dismissed three or four parliaments that were not pliant to his will, and that up to the present he has done so with impunity—not that the wave of radicalism is not increasing in violence and may in opposing a peace which falls so far short of Japanese desire as to be pronounced ineffectual, actually get control of the ship of state, to the confusion of the peacemakers and the quiet of the eastern world.

After all is said, party government in Japan is a farce, or rather a sham, and the elder statesmen who secured the confidence of the mikado in the stormy days of the revolution and restoration of 1868 rule the country as unobscuredly as ever did Craven out-guards of that coterie of Russian grand dukes of which we hear so much and know so little. Ito, Yamagata, Inoue, Matsukata and Hayashi, the ambassadors in London, are the names of these party and most potent counselors, and in the name of the emperor they rule the empire. These statesmen differ more or less in their party affiliations, but they

one and all belong to the Satsuna, the Chishin or one of the smaller affiliated clans of southern Japan which placed the emperor on his throne a generation ago and have monopolized his attention and his confidence ever since. It has been thought by many that one of the most potent causes of the Russian war was the necessity which the southern clansmen felt of consolidating their power, instead of consecrating it by the successful leadership of a popular war. While the constitutional rights of the Japanese people are purely illusory and the restraints upon the power of the emperor are ineffective, still the people of Japan have been discussing these matters for the last five years, and in such a tone as suggested to the leaders of the clans the desirability of changing the subject. It is a great joy for the Japanese to see that their beloved land has secured the position of a world power, but they know better than anyone else at what a terrific cost the position has been attained. The men of Satsuna and of Chishin, who for 100 generations have been taught, as were our Indians, that war is the only worthy pursuit of man, secure the honors, the pensions and the decorations which come from victory, but it is the poor rice growers of the paddy fields who supply the human food for powder and pay the taxes.
