The complainant alleges that the company owes \$107,000 and has only \$7 in the treasury. #### Utah Gold Company Asks \$1,331.06 for Bad Faith in Contract.

The Pittsburg & Utah Gold, Silver, Copper & Lead Mining company has filed suit in the district court against Matthew T. Gisborn to recover \$1,331.06, alleged to be due on a mining deal. It is alleged that on May 22, 1902, an agree-ment was entered into whereby defend-ant was to sell to plaintiff for \$50,000 the Mone tunnel claim in Toosle court the Mono tunnel claim in Tooele coun-ty. It was represented by defendant that there were 400 sacks of ore in the workings of the mine, valued at \$1,200, which would go to plaintiff. The agree-ment of sale was drawn are not ment of sale was drawn up at an ex-pense of \$211.10, which amount Gisborn agreed to pay. It was discovered that the sacks contained waste with the exthe sacks contained waste with the ex-ception of a little ore on top. The to-tal value of the ore in the sacks was only \$79.04, instead of \$1,200 as repre-sented, hence plaintiff asks judgment for the difference in the value of the ore, \$1,120.96, and also for the money expended in drawing up the agreement, \$210.10
