

RUSSIANS FIRE ON BRITISH STEAMER

Had Approached Too Close to Place of Meeting of Emperors Nicholas and William.

NERVOUS FOR CZAR'S SAFETY.

Three Hundred and Fifty British Warships Being Mobilized for Annual Maneuvers.

Viborg, Finland, June 14.—The British steamer Northburg was fired upon last night by a Russian torpedo boat near the island of Birko for approaching too close to the bay on the Finnish coast, where Emperor Nicholas and Emperor William are to meet today.

CZAR WELCOMES KAISER.

Helsingfors, Finland, June 17.—The German Emperor, Kaiser Wilhelm, joined Emperor Nicholas on board, joined the Russian squadron conveying Emperor Nicholas on board the imperial yacht Standart, at 10 o'clock this morning.

BRITISH FLEET MOBILIZING.

London, June 17.—The mobilization of the British fleet for the annual maneuvers was practically completed this morning, and something like 350 warships are making their way to their respective stations. The maneuvers were to be secret, but the general scheme was understood to be a repetition of the plan of last year which, however, resulted in a fiasco, as owing to the fog the opposing fleets were unable to contact.

TOKIO NOT EXCITED OVER HAWAIIAN SITUATION

Tokio, June 17.—The report that the Japanese of Hawaii had appealed to Tokyo charging violation of treaty rights as an outcome of the strike against the government in his behalf, in spite of the fact that he knew it was useless the brother conveyed the appeal to the government.

A dispatch received here from the Japanese consul in Honolulu says the strike situation is improving and all the men in two districts have returned to work. The strike, the consul says, is a result of agitation on the part of Japanese anarchists. The work is not among the Japanese, who have been trying to persuade all their countrymen to join a union. They claimed, the dispatch further asserts, that they would be in receipt of money from the consuls for the purpose of collecting money.

ASTRONOMICAL PHENOMENA SCHEDULED FOR TONIGHT

New York, June 17.—Two interesting and rare astronomical phenomena are scheduled for this evening. The moon will eclipse four-fifths of the sun at two minutes after 7 o'clock in the evening. The eclipse will last for three hours and the tail, at least, of Brooks' wonderful comet, is expected to come into plain view.

DEAD OF BLOOD POISONING FROM STOCKING DYE

New York, June 17.—Mrs. Phoebe Clayton of Freehold, N. J., is dead in the hospital at Long Branch of blood poisoning caused by dye from her stocking, which penetrated a wound she received last week.
