This morning the two latter were taken before Justice Pyper on a charge of being loose characters, and vagrants on general principles, having been, by their drunkenness and other bad conduct, a public nuisance, and they were fined \$100 each, with the alternative of imprisonment for one hundred days.

New Bridge. - During the high water last spring what was known as the Bybee Bridge, at the Devil's Gate, Weber Canon, was swept away, and the erection of another, under the auspices of Davis and Weber Counties, with some aid from Morgan County, has been commenced. The work will be carried on under the immediate direction of Mr. Joel Parish, of Centreville, road commissioner for the county of Davis. The new structure will be constructed of red pine timbers, bolted with heavy iron. It will be self-supporting, and consist of a single span of one hundred feet. From the covering or flooring of the bridge to the top of the side timbers will measure 12 feet and it will be 14 feet wide. It is estimated that the job will cost between \$1,500 and \$2,000.
