

POLITICAL POINTERS

To properly notify Jesse William Knight of his nomination for governor on the Democratic ticket, the Democrats of Salt Lake will journey to Provo Saturday evening on a special train carrying with them all proper trimmings in the nature of red light, a brass band, and campaign oratory.

Major Sam A. King, state chairman, will head the procession, and it is expected that a low rate which has been arranged for from Ogden, will bring a large number of Weberites, while Utah county men are expected to come in such numbers as to swell the crowd to 2,000 or over.

The Democratic special will leave Salt Lake over the Salt Lake Route at 4 p. m. Saturday, and is due at Provo at 5:30. It will be met at the depot by the B. Y. U. band, and a parade of the streets will be made preceding the notification meeting. This will commence at 8 o'clock p. m., and the speech of notification will be made by Levi N. Harmon of Price. In addition to this speech, a speaker from the Democratic national committee's list has been promised, to make the keynote effort for the campaign, and candidates on the state ticket are expected to be heard from.

The rally will mark the opening of the state campaign, which Major King promises to push vigorously from that date on.

The state committee has selected headquarters in the Kenyon hotel, the rooms being on the first floor facing Second South and Main streets. They were opened today, and were much visited by Democratic leaders.

Burl Armstrong has resigned from the Intermountain Republican, on which paper he has been the political writer since the date of its founding, to accept the position of secretary of the Republican county committee. From now on Armstrong will give all his time to politics.

The means adopted by the Republicans to secure the withdrawal of their electors from the "American" ticket have been to have their electors voluntarily withdraw from the ticket as filed. This is a privilege which the law guarantees to them, up to 12 days before the election. The method of filing a protest against the "American" petition was abandoned.

On Oct. 14 the Democrats will open a Bingham campaign with a rally in the mining camp preceded by a special train from Salt Lake to take out the local crowd.

Congressman Howell and William Spry will open a campaign in the southern part of the state on Oct. 16. Their itinerary will be extensive and

will include all of the large population centers.

Utah Socialists have arranged a debate, in which former State Senator Rideout will meet the Socialist speakers Oct. 14 in the Murray Opera House.

At a meeting of the joint convention committee of the Commercial club and the district council of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, held last night in the club rooms, an audit was made of the entertainment expenses of the carpenters. It was found that the cost of caring for the convention had been \$4,500.

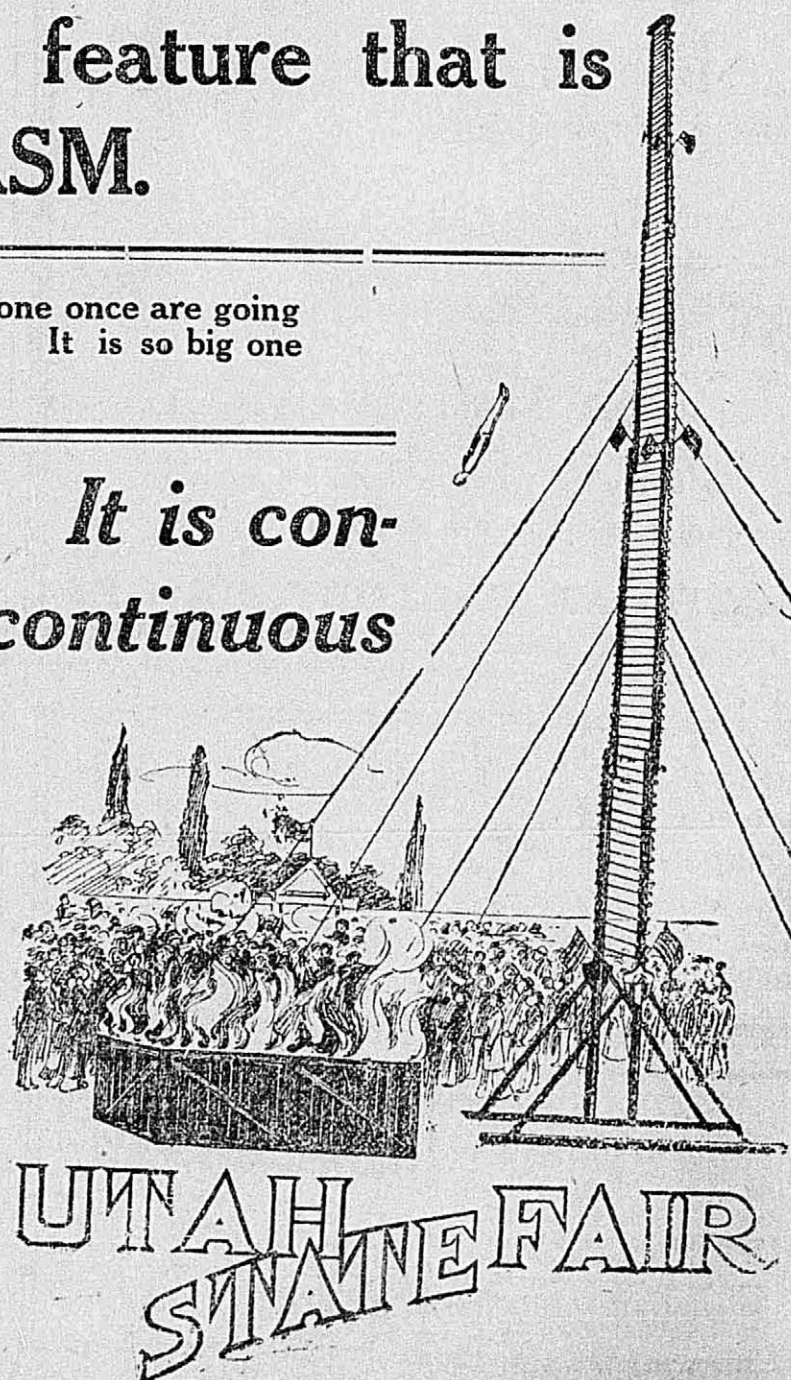
