GOLD HOLDUP AND ROBBERY

Spurious Disappearance of Thomas F. Bullock, of Warren.

Divorce and Other Court Cases—Mason Will Celebrate—Short Session of Board of Education.

A hold-up and robbery occurred last evening at 10:30 at the Riverside saloon. The saloon is situated on the north side of Ogden river bridge in a somewhat quiet place, and at the time mentioned three men entered the saloon with handcuffs tied over their faces just below the eyes and demanded of the night bartender, R. C. Tracy, that he hold up his hands, which he refused to do. He was then seized by the throat and held up to the ceiling.

The saloon was then searched and a large bottle of whiskey was found. The bartender, Tracy, was then released and the three men fled. Tracy says he thinks the robbers were young men and novices at their job as one of them shook very nervously during the proceedings.

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MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE.
The disappearance of Thomas F. Bullock, of Warren, Weber county, has been reported to the sheriff's office. Mr. Bullock is a young man about 29 years of age and was always a member of the local good character. On the morning of June 13th, he left home, riding his bicycle and apparently in good spirits. In the day he was seen around the streets of Ogden, this was circus day, and from that time up to the present he has not been seen or heard of. His parents and friends are very much alarmed over his strange disappearance and have been using every possible effort to find some trace of his whereabouts, but with no success. He could not have been waylaid for his money by hobo because so far as his folks know when he left home he had but 60 cents in his possession, and whether some sad misfortune had befallen him or not is a mystery to everybody. Mr. Bullock is a man about 5 feet 9 inches in height; weighs about 140 pounds; is medium complexion; wears a sandy mustache; when he left home he had on a brown suit of clothes and broad brimmed brown hat.

INDEPENDENCE DAY PROGRAM.
