A GRAND GATHERING.—The New York World says the Germans in America are preparing for a vast International Festival, in which the rifle clubs, the singing societies and all the vast array of orchestral unions of the Old World and the New are to be reunited in the city of New York in one mammoth exhibition of skill and emulation such as the world has never before witnessed. The details of this magnificent festival, which have already been decided upon, enable one to form some conception of the entertainment which is in preparation for the American public. The project, comprehensive and splendid as it is, originated about three years ago at an immense meeting of sharpshooters from almost every European country, held in one of the famous free towns of Germany. To this nearly every Schutzen corps in the United States sent a delegation; and, after the usual rifle matches had ended, with more or less satisfaction to the contestants, some one started the idea of inviting the organizations of the Fatherland to visit America. The World does not state the exact time when this great gathering of the nations is to come off, but describes some of the elaborate preparations being made for it.
