Charles B. Markland is now en route to Mr. Tabor's plantation at Portland, Ore., for treatment. He left the city last night in the custody of a friend.

A 16-ton boiler has been received by the Light & Power company for installation at the central plant, where it will be of material aid to the generating machinery already there.

The fences have been cleared away from in front of the new Holmes apartment building on First street, and the sidewalks cleaned up, so that the general appearance of the locality is strikingly attractive.

A life sized portrait of Bishop Scamman has just been completed by George Taggart. It is a Christmas present to the bishop by the Knights of Columbus.

The portrait is a fine piece of work and can be seen tomorrow at the bishop's residence.

The regular meeting of the Woman's Democratic club will be held on Wednesday, the 14th inst., at 2:30 p. m., at the residence of Mrs. John Shea, 163 west Third South street. This is the first day for the annual election of officers and a full attendance is desired.

The Utah Poultry association will hold its fifteenth annual show at 107-109 south State street. It will be a red-letter occasion for the association, and will present the largest and finest thoroughbred poultry ever exhibited in the state, besides incubators, brooders and poultry supplies in great variety.

Ex-Sheriff George H. Taylor and his family left this morning for their ranch in Cache county, where they will reside in the future. The sheriff made a record during his term of office, which any official would be proud. More arrests were made and more prisoners cared for under his administration than at any other time in the history of his county.

George Poulter of Bountiful was painfully injured yesterday afternoon by being thrown from his buggy, just north of this city by his runaway horse, the vehicle rolling over and over. Mrs. Poulter was thrown out from in front of St. Mark's hospital, where both sufferers were cared for. The lady was not much hurt, but Mr. Poulter's shoulder was dislocated and his face badly cut, besides being otherwise bruised.

Two young women applied at the naval recruiting office yesterday afternoon for jobs as nurses on men of war. But their services were declined with thanks, as the navy is not accepting women nurses in time of peace. One colored man wanted to become a sailor, but was told his services would be confined to passing up the black diamonds for the furnaces. This offer he declined with some indignation, as he didn't propose to eat coal for a living. The recruiting officials are notified that native born Mexicans and Chinamen will not be accepted for naval service.

The immense organ of Grace church, Chicago, which Organist McCallan of the Salt Lake tabernacle had the pleasure of playing on while in Chicago recently, is made up of six organs, as follows: Great organ, 15 stops, 1,198 pipes; swell organ, 17 stops, 1,198 pipes; choir organ, 11 stops, 610 pipes; solo organ six stops, 366 pipes; echo organ, four stops, 244 pipes; pedal organ, 10 stops, 320 pipes; total, 66 speaking stops, 3,714 pipes. In addition to the above there are 14 coupler stops, six mechanical accessory stops, 45 adjustable combination pistons, and 17 combination pedals and pedal movements. Total number of stop actions, 145. There are carillons (from tenor C) up in the choir organ, and there is an English horn stop in the same organ.

CONDITIONS IN SAN JUAN COUNTY

Representative Redd Reports a Happy Feeling Down There.

PLENTY OF WATER IN SIGHT

Indian Situation the Only Thing Likely to Cause Trouble - Navajos Are Actually in Need.

Representative W. H. Redd of San Juan county is in the city. The gentleman enjoys the distinction of being the first Republican to grace the halls of the Legislature from his section, and he is naturally quite proud of his position. Mr. Redd says he comes here entirely unpledged either as to the senatorial question or any other matter that may happen to come up during the session. He hopes, however, while here to work for the best interests of the state in general and to do a little something for his county in particular, but so far as being committed to any issue, that is entirely out of the question.

The people of San Juan say Mr. Redd, are feeling better than they have for some time. Reports have been made from the agricultural experiment station indicate that San Juan has some of the best land in the state for this purpose. Mr. Redd says sheep are doing well down there, but cattle have not done so well owing to there being so much snow on the ranges.

NAVAJOS IN NEED.

The Indian question, says Mr. Redd, is a matter of great concern to the people of that country. As reports have indicated for a good while, the Navajos are actually in want and many of them must suffer greatly unless assistance is forthcoming very soon. It was the general impression that sub-Agent Sheenmaker, who lives at Fruita, New Mexico, had received a sum amounting to \$13,000, for the care of these people, but it seems that the appropriation has exhausted itself—how, it is not known—and the Indians are now as the mercy of the elements, so to speak, and the kindness of their white friends in the settlements surrounding them. For a long while they have been living on horseback, and the result is they have very little to eat themselves, this source of supply is well exhausted, and the Indians are becoming desperate in their efforts to keep body and soul together. The result is they are jeopardizing the interests of their white neighbors and the latter are growing just a trifle uneasy lest the situation become vastly more serious than they are at present. Mr. Redd made application for letters certifying to actual conditions and for receiving positive evidence that the Indians were on the verge of starvation, he wrote back stating that their wants should be immediately attended to. The matter, however, has not yet received attention.

Mr. Redd says the people of San Juan are in good health, and were it not for the Indian situation, would feel at ease and at peace with all mankind. The gentleman expects to remain at his post until his duties as a legislator have been discharged.

ACCIDENT TO HENRY MATSCHER

Falls Thirty Feet While Climbing a Ladder in Eureka Hill Mine.

Eureka, Utah, Jan. 9.—While climbing a ladder in the Eureka Hill mine last night Henry Matscher fell about 30 feet and was quite seriously injured.

The day shift was just going to the surface and Matscher was going up to the 100-foot level. He carried his lunch bucket, pick and candlestick, and in going up the ladder his light was extinguished, he left his hold and fell backward to a platform 30 feet below.

Two other miners were below him upon the same ladder, and they went down and carried him to the shaft. After being removed to his home a physician was called and his injuries, which consisted of several broken ribs on the right side, were attended to. Unless there are untoward internal injuries the man will recover in a short time.

Matscher was taken to the Holy Cross hospital at Salt Lake City this morning. Mr. Matscher is president of the Eureka Miners' union.

UNDER ADVISEMENT.

District Judges Will Decide on the Matter of a Grand Jury.

Judges Morse, Hall and Stewart, of the district court, heard the arguments of a number of citizens last night, in the former's court room, on the necessity of empaneling a special grand jury to investigate the evils of the city.

Brief statements were made by E. R. Critchlow, C. S. Varian, Bishop Leonard, William Igleheart and Dist. Atty. Pichner, after which the judges took the matter under advisement.

It was argued that the condition of affairs in the tenderloin district, as brought to light by the Ryan murder, should be investigated by a grand jury. The failure in the enforcement of the Sunday liquor law, gambling and the sale of liquor to minors, it was contended, should be thoroughly investigated.
