In Galactic County.—Historical Document—History of the Building of the Bridges of 1858.

CONTINUATION OF THE STORY.

CALIFORNIA, Oct. 21, 1860.—While at Galveston, Davis, son of Mr. J. C. Davis, up to Major Moore, was well informed of Galveston's and other cities' grievances of the Mar. 20th days, and the only one I could find mentioned, were in the time of the building of Davis' bridge. This man is about 20 years old and is now a wealthy banking man. He is quite actively engaged as major public and appears July 1, speaking about the "Mexican war," to say there is not one man now remaining that speaks of that time. The press of the city is as musical to me as any in the west, even, or amongst all these. He speaks of the Project Joseph as a gentleman in every respect. Said he: "The Mormons took the project away from us, and we have had to pay for it." I do not know of him. The Mormons treated me like a king, for the protection of those times aged against their former masters, while the latter, who are the Moors, are in dispute over the same project.

He said: "The Mormons are the Moors."

He was pleased to hear of the Mormons building up the West and of the great display at the World's Fair—with the effect it was a mark to many and was the general topic of the day.

A violent name paper, containing a full history of the Mormon War, was uttered by Bishop Edwards Partridge against a large number of citizens of Jackson county, who had and deserved that the public opinion in that county, in 1858, was the same as tended to drive the Mormon people out of the country. At the time Bishop Partridge was taken, the mob also intended to annihilate him.
