LEADVILLE, 4.—This afternoon Jim Kenney shot and fatally wounded John Lukenbill after a brief altercation, during which the latter struck at Kenney with a revolver. The cause of the quarrel was a bet of Lukenbill's that Kenney seduced his wife. Both men were gamblers. The affair created great excitement and a large crowd surrounded the jail, crying "lynch him," but were finally quieted and dispersed.

FOREIGN.

CITY OF MEXICO, 2.—Congress opened and President Guzman read an address. It stated the Guatemalan difficulty remains unsettled, and Guatemala must now speedily renounce the idea of acquiring the states of Chiapas or Suconusco or war is inevitable.

The President congratulated the country on the great progress made in building railroad and telegraph lines, the increase of public revenues and the emigration of Latin races of Europe to Mexico. He defended the government's action in the State of Zalasco trouble, stating the time had arrived when all interior strife must be settled in some peaceable manner.

LONDON, 2.—The St. James Gazette, referring to a dispatch from the New York correspondent of the Standard, stating that the American Secretary of State had requested Mr. Lowell to apply for a reprieve of Mr. Lamson, hopes that Mr. Frelinghuysen has not instructed Mr. Lowell to do anything so unusual and so improper, and has the following offensive paragraph: "We trust that if the United States government should really have committed itself in the manner alleged, that it will receive the rebuff at the Home Office which it so richly deserves, and which the Home Secretary, among his other accomplishments, is very well qualified to administer to it."

The Spanish steamer Yrurac B, Captain Ugarte, from Liverpool for Porto Rico, came in collision with the Royal Mail Company's steamer Douro from Brazil, off the coast of Finisterre, Spain, on Saturday night. Both steamers sank. The steamer Hidalgo rescued 17 persons from the Douro and 87 from the Yrurac, and landed them at Coruna.

Thirty of the crew of the Yrurac, including the captain and pilot, were drowned.

Thirty-five of the Douro's passengers were saved. The number of drowned is unknown.

Sir Henry Wrixen Beecher, Baronet Creagh, of County Cork, Ireland, and Lady Beecher were saved from the steamship Douro, which came in collision off Cape Finisterre with the steamer Yrurac B. The names of 24 of the passengers saved are published, but includes no Americans. The third and fourth engineers of the Douro were also saved. The Douro had on board £53,000 specie. The crew numbered 81. It is known that the first and second engineers and four passengers are among the drowned.

It appears from dispatches from Newcastle that the race on the Tyne this afternoon, between Hanlon and Boyd, was a fairly close one. Some accounts state that Hanlon won by from two to three lengths. Boyd won toss for position, and chose the north side of the river. At the start, which was a splendid one, Hanlon led slightly. At Redhugh bridge, four and a half furlongs from the starting point, Hanlon had increased his lead to one and a half lengths. The length of the course was about three miles and three and a half furlongs. An immense crowd witnessed the race. Hanlon's time, 21.08.

ST. GEORGE STAKE CONFERENCE.

The St. George Quarterly Stake Conference met on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, 18th 19th and 20th of March, 1882, President John D. T. McAllister presiding.

Of the general authorities of the Church we had present Henry Harriman and Jacob Gates of the First Seven Presidents of the Seventies. There were also present Heber J. Grant of the Tooele Stake, and during part of the time we had the presence of Apostle Erastus Snow, Elders John R. Murdock and Wm. Fotheringham, of Beaver Stake, and Elder Henry Lunt, of Parowan Stake.

Every Ward of the Stake was represented excepting Panacca.

The attendance of the Priesthood and people of the Stake was unusually large.

The speakers, as a rule, were necessarily brief and were as follows in the order of speaking: President Eyring, Bishop Charles N. Smith, Bishop Edward Bunker, President McAllister, Bishop Thos. S. Terry, Bishop Joseph Knell, Elder Charles Stapley, Jr., Elder Heber J. Grant, Bishop W. Granger, Bishop Thomas Judd, Bishop Chas. A. Terry, Bishop David H. Cannon, Bishop Geo. H. Crosby, Bishop Marcus Funk, Bishop Jos. S. Huntsman, Pres. McArthur, Pres. Henry Harriman, Pres. McAllister, Elder Wm. Fotheringham, Elder John R. Murdock, Apostle Erastus Snow, Pres. Jacob Gates, and finally Bro. Snow, who delivered the closing address of the Conference, in doing which he held the deeply earnest attention of the people for two hours and three minutes.

Interspersed between the addresses were read the statistical, Primary Association, Young Men's M. I. A., Young Ladies' M. I. A., Sunday School and Relief Societies' Reports. The general and local authorities of the Church were sustained by uplifted hand, and the exhibit of St. George Temple ordinance work, and the Stake tithing report for 1881 were presented to the conference.

In consequence of the last session of the Legislature having changed the boundary lines of Iron County so as to include the settlement of Kanarra, the ecclesiastical ward of Kanarra was by the vote of conference detached from St. George Stake, that it may become part of Parowan Stake.

The proceedings of the conference were characterized by deepest attention, strongest spirit of union, and fervently firm reliance on Israel's God.

The Spirit of the Lord was evidently with speakers and hearers, and there was no uncertain sound in the shepherd's voices.

The Clerk read the statistical report of Parowan Stake.

Bishops John E. Dalley and John L. Jones addressed the Saints. Brothers Jacob Gates, David M. Cannon and Jas. G. Bleak came in the meeting on their way to Milford, the two former brethren gave us very interesting and instructive discourses.

2 p. m.

The sacrament was administered by Elders Beuk Neilson and James W. Pugson.

President Jones read a communi-

cation from President John D. T. McAllister, of St. George Stake, stating that owing to the Legislature changing the boundary line of Iron County, it was agreed, at their Conference, that Kanarra Ward be attached to Parowan Stake, and on motion of Priest Jones Kanarra Ward was accepted.

Councillor Wm. S. Berrey made a short address, after which the General and Local Authorities were presented to the Conference and unanimously accepted.

After a short address by Councillor Edward Dalton Priest T. I. Jones presented the names of the Home Missionaries for the ensuing quarter who were unanimously sustained. The choir sang an anthem.

Conference adjourned without date. Benediction by Patriarch Henry Lunt.
