Our country is still improving, emigrants coming in regularly; some emigrants landed at our neighbor ing. city a few days back from the Southern States, and since that time three from San Juan country, S. S. Smith, president of the Manasseh Stake, Brother Lyman and one other family. Conference will be held at Mannasseh to-day and tomorrow. Several of the Saints are working on the railroad and making from \$3.50 to \$4 per day. The health of the settlement is good and crops are looking fine, having plenty of water for irrigating purposes. The hay in the surrounding country is good and promises a fine harvest this year. All seem to be in good spirits and getting along finely. The work on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad is being pushed forward very rapidly. The 4th was celebrated here by picnic and other exercises. There is but little excitement of a political nature in our country. We are having fine weather and crops are growing splendid. Considerable excitement in the mining districts, some new leads have been opened up in the past few days that promise to be very rich, a gold mine. some 40 miles southwest of this is attracting several people to that point.

NEW PROCESS OF FRUIT CURING.

SPRINGVILLE, July 12, 1880. Editors Deservet News:

A report comes from the Mountain Messenger of a process which makes cold work the effect of what has heretofore been done with heat. An experiment was made at a drying by blast of cold air. In this experiment about a peck of sliced apples were placed in a sieve and subjected to a cold air blast for three and a half hours in the cupola furnace of the foundry, and the fruit is reported to have been completely and beautifully cured by the treat-
