

of the female suffrage convention. Mrs. Dr. Lozier, president, read the annual address. Speeches were made by Mrs. Hooker and Mrs. Harbart.

President Hayes has definitely determined to make the Chinese question the subject of a special message to Congress. In this message he will call attention to the present and prospective evils of unlimited Chinese immigration to this country, and will recommend Congress to take such action as in its wisdom may be most proper and efficient to restrict and regulate the immigration of Mongolians.

The cabinet discussed the report of the board of engineers appointed by the Secretary of War to examine Eads' improvements on the Mississippi River, and approved the same, whereupon it was decided that Eads should receive the amount of money appropriated by Congress for his payment, upon the compliance by him with the provisions of the law.

CHICAGO, 8.—Most people here are losing faith in the prospect for a mining stock boom. Last night's meeting was destitute of actual results and was adjourned for a week. It is said that the character of one or two men who seem most interested in it is enough to condemn it and to secure general opposition to its establishment. New York and western agents have been active in getting it on foot, but their efforts appear to be fruitless. It is charged that it will be established, if at all, simply for stock gambling, and not for legitimate business.

NEW YORK, 8.—The report of the commissioners of emigration shows that the total number of aliens who arrived at this port last year was 54,536, a decrease of 16,129 compared with the previous year.

The sale of Plymouth Church pews, for the ensuing year, took place to-night. The total receipts for premiums and rents for last year were \$47,396; this year's receipts will be \$36,904; last year the premiums were \$34,663, and this year \$34,171.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., 8.—Montgomery Blair, in the House of Delegates to-day, introduced a resolution, memorializing Congress, which sets forth that the late electoral bill provided that no decision of the presidential election under the act should preclude a judicial decision of the question; that the act contemplated a decision of the case submitted to the electoral commission by a judicial tribunal; that the commission did hold itself incompetent to inquire whether some of the State returns were true or false, and that the President is seated in virtue of notoriously fraudulent returns, which Justice Strong, whose vote seated him, has admitted and as the President himself has admitted by disregarding the returns in the matter of the State officers whose titles were identical with his, whilst the repudiation of these returns by the incumbent, for all purposes save his own election, is admission that it was fraud to use them for that purpose, the motive which produced this partial repudiation greatly aggravate his offense; that by the published statement of John Young Brown, which has remained uncontradicted since April, 1877, this repudiation was a condition imposed by the said Brown and his associates, then holding the balance of power in the House of Representatives, upon which alone the incumbent would be allowed to be counted into office upon these false returns; that this condition was accepted for the incumbent by Stanley Matthews and Charles Foster, then and since his closest friends and most authoritative representatives; that Brown and his associates had been elected as adversaries of the incumbent, but separated from the great body of their political associates in the House of Representatives, to carry into effect said arrangement; that at the time of entering into it they were the leading advocates of the bill then pending in the House to grant a large subsidy to the Texas Pacific Railroad Company, to which the president-elect was known to be opposed, and it is a just inference, from all the circumstances, that whilst they were willing to defeat his inauguration for this reason,

they would not venture to act with their political opponents for that object, if such co-operation involved also the surrender of the local governments of the States in question as well as of their electoral votes to their political opponents; that to remove the obstacle it was stipulated in effect that the incumbent should treat the returns as fraudulent, so far as they affected the local governments of said States, by withdrawing the United States troops, the presence of which alone, it was known, gave them any force; that it thus appears the constitutional question so gravely and elaborately debated in Congress before the electoral commission and in the public press, as a question on which the presidential contest hinged, and with which the public mind was so long exercised, has no part whatever in determining the contest, but that it was in fact determined by a party of men elected by one party, but openly acting with their opponents in the interest of a certain railroad corporation at the decisive moment; that every interest of the country is greatly prejudiced, and its most vital interests are put in jeopardy by suffering the people to be superseded as the political power, and substituting for them such moneyed organizations as will pay for defrauding them; that, in the opinion of your memorialists, the continued prostration of the business of the country is largely due to the fact that the confidence of the people in the conduct of public officers is shaken; that an irresponsible executive administration has been installed, which has not the support of the country or either of its great political parties; that this conflicts with the whole theory of our institutions and those of the mother country, whence they are derived; that to carry on, as to get possession of the government, the incumbent must seek support from those elected as his opponents; that this relation is in itself corrupting is shown by reason as well as all experience; that no useful public service can be rendered by an administration whose title to power rests on fraudulent election returns, manufactured by its own partisans and made effectual by an agreement with the subsidy and jobbing men of the opposing party; that the indispensable first step to any reform of the public service is to restore the government to the people; that it is only by men who have been elected by the people and who are free from all entangling alliances with the jobbing interests, from which all the great abuses have sprung, that any reform can be effected. Your memorialists, therefore, pray that needful legislation may be adopted, to ascertain judicially who was elected president at the last election and to give effect to the will of the people, and will ever pray, etc.

Blair advocated his memorial, urging its adoption and reviewing generally President Hayes' title to the office.

Leib, republican, moved to lay it on the table, and called for the ayes and noes, which resulted—ayes 13, noes 54.

It was then referred to the committee on federal relations.

St. Louis, 8.—J. C. Fryer, manager of Fryer, Papperheim & Adams' Opera Company, has been missing since Friday last. Diligent search fails to discover his whereabouts. His disappearance is entirely unaccountable to the members of the company.

CLEVELAND, 8.—The thirtieth annual convention of the American Dairymen's Association met to-day. There was a large attendance. Subjects of interest were discussed. It was stated that the dairy interest was growing rapidly and higher prices than ever before were prevailing. The exports to Great Britain last year were 110,000,000 pounds, worth over \$13,000,000. A large increase over past years. Francis D. Moulton spoke on the salt question.

SAN FRANCISCO, 8.—Henry W. Grayson, was arrested yesterday in Portland, Oregon, on a requisition from the Governor of Kansas, on the charge of murdering Allen G. Potill, in Johnson County, Kansas, November 1st, 1867.

Another general rain has visited the State within the last 24 hours.

Henry L. Sparges, late postmaster at Fort Bidwell, convicted in the United States circuit court of embezzling \$1,041 government money, was sentenced to a fine equal to the amount of the embezzlement and nine months imprisonment.
