In Justice Burton's court yesterday afternoon the suit of Thomas Fenton vs. Wm. Burke was heard and determined in favor of the plaintiff. Mr. Fenton owned twenty acres of land in the Fifth Ward, and had occupied the street between the two blocks. When the street was declared open last fall he was given permission by the city to leave that portion of his property stock which was in the street until he could conveniently remove it. Subsequently he sold one of the blocks, and Mr. Burke became the owner. The latter proceeded to take up Mr. Fenton's trees, claiming that as the street was in front of his property, he was entitled to them. Some 500 worth of trees was thus removed, and Mr. Fenton brought suit to recover the amount, with costs. When the judgment of the court went against him he gave notice of an appeal.

The passenger department of the Union Pacific announce that one of the Bassett brothers has just arrived from the Yellowstone National Park on a trip of inspection, and says that the Excelsior Geyser, or "Hell's Half Acre," is now in full operation, playing every 55 minutes. It throws water from 225 to 250 feet high. Its crater covers an area of 100 by 200 yards. This geyser has not been in action but once before in recent years, and that in 1882. It is on the main road, three miles from Fire Hole Basin. The road from Beard Canon to the Yellowstone Park is in good condition.

The Pennsylvania Line has now put on a train which will be known as the "Pennsylvania Special," leaving St. Louis at 8 a. m. and Chicago at 10 a. m., daily, reaching New York at 3 p. m. next afternoon. Trains will be run solid from St. Louis and Chicago without change. The Missouri Pacific has put on a special train from Denver to St. Louis to connect with the Pennsylvania Special, and the Burlington Route also runs a fast express from Denver to Chicago, connecting with the special from that point. The Rio Grande system has adjusted its trains to arrive at Denver and Pueblo to make direct connections with these Missouri Pacific and Burlington route fast trains; within a few months they expect to give notice of a fast train from Denver and Pueblo to Chicago via the new Rock Island route.

Shot Himself.

Mamie Brock is the name of a woman about twenty-five years of age, who is said to be the wife of George Brock, now in Montana. A few months ago she was arrested by the police on a charge of being an inmate of a house at 115 East 1st St. for her appearance for trial, but failing to come, the amount was forfeited. Lately she has been residing at a house about three-quarters of a block south of the Theatre, with her sister, Mrs. P. D. Sprague, formerly known as Laura Cornell.

About half-past ten last night Mrs. Brock asked her sister for a pistol she had loaned her, but Mrs. Sprague declined to give it to her. What passed between them is unknown, but from subsequent events it must have been something of an unpleasant nature, for Mrs. Brock went out to the gate, whither she was followed by Mrs. Sprague, who handed her sister the pistol.

A moment later there was a pistol shot, and Mrs. Brock fell to the ground exclaiming, "My God, I'm shot." Dr. Burroughs was summoned, and staunching the flow of blood from an ugly wound below the left breast. The injured woman was taken into the house, and cared for. She asked for her sister, and when the latter came in exclaimed, "I've done it! Laura, but regret it." "What made you do it?" was Mrs. Sprague's inquiry, which brought the reply, "Because I was mad." Neither of the parties would give any further information as to the cause of the attempted suicide.

She was tried on Monday before Justice Warnock of Monroe, who committed her to the county jail for twenty days. She was brought over to Richfield by S. J. Gelling and placed in jail, where she will remain the specified time. She appeared a little reticent at first, but became more communicative over the affair after a short time.—Richfield Advertiser, June 6.
