24 .- The trial of Jame s Burk for the killing of Warren S. Harrison in September last, was concluded this after-noon by the jury returning a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree, ccompanying their finding with a recmmendation to mercy. This morning the defense placed ex-

opinion that a man in such a condition would not know what he was doing. after having imbibed the amount of whisky that the defendant is known to have had at the time of the killing, especially a man whose mind was weakened by years of indulgence in spiritu ous liquor. As to any man being able to take into his system a gallon of whisky and still retain the power to form an intent and carry it into execu tion, all three of the doctors deemed it absolutely impossible. When the testimony was concluded, each side was given two and a half hours in which to argue the case. The prosecution was opened by B. H. Jones, attorney for the State, in a vigorous presentation of the case, go ing into the testimony in detail. At-torney Nels Jensen was the first to appear for the defense. Mr. Jensen ar gued that Burke could not justly b convicted of a greater crime than that of murder in the second degree. Mr. Holton followed with a strong argu-ment for the defense.
