LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Obsequies.—The body of the late Mr. A. W. White, whose death at Silver Reef we chronicled a day or two ago, reached this city last evening. The funeral was held this forenoon at 11 o'clock at St. Mark's Cathedral.

More Indictments.—The Grand Jury, which has been sitting for eight days, has found twenty indictments, all but one under the laws of the Territory. Ten of these were reported this morning, the others were found last week.

Firemen's Grand Ball.—A grand dress ball takes place in the Theatre, New Year's Eve, given by the Salt Lake Fire Department. Careless Orchestra will provide the music, and the affair is expected to be a spectacular and social success in every particular.

Discharged.—I. Watters was examined today for abusing and threatening Dr. Clinton, as related several days ago. The affidavit charging him with assault and battery, which could not be proven, he was discharged. Had the charge been differently worded, the outcome would have been different.

Information Wanted.—If Mr. John W. Hill, late of Rugby, England, and his wife, Mary Hill, (when last heard from was in Salt Lake City,) will write to the Executors of the will of the late Mr. Thomas Freeman, of Allesey, or to his solicitor, Mr. Bailey, Coventry, England, they will hear of something greatly to their advantage.

Museum.—A small specimen of porcupine fish has been presented by Mrs. Jennie C. Taylor, of this city, by the courtesy of Brother Thomas Halley, of Ogden City, who brought it from the office of Obed Taylor, Esq., architect, Deseret Bank building.

A photograph of a fossil fish from Monticello County, has been received from Professor Ed. D. Cape, of Philadelphia.

Failed to Indict.—Among a number of cases ignored by the Grand Jury now in session, is that of Freeman v. Cheshire, for assault with a deadly weapon. Our readers will remember the circumstance, which occurred several months ago, wherein John H. Freeman accused George Cheshire of stabbing him while walking around his house late in the evening. Three other cases from Park City, one for robbery, one for assault and another for forgery, were also let alone. The evidence was not deemed sufficient to justify an indictment in any of them.

Theatre.—"A Man of the People" was witnessed last evening by a very large audience. Nearly all of the seats were occupied, extra chairs were sold with readiness and many persons remained standing during the evening. Owing to the vast crowd and the emanations from the registers, the house was some of the time uncomfortably warm; this was about all that was complained of by the audience. The play is a very good sensational drama, and though not possessing the literary merit of the "Phoenix," Mr. Noble's other production, it ranks well with it as a companion play. The dialogue in both pieces is far above the rhetoric of the ordinary drama of this character, and though many words and expressions are rude and slangy, which is no doubt necessary in the presentation of such peculiar phases of life, the plays are otherwise remarkably chaste and contain nothing to offend the sensibilities of the refined. Another good feature in Mr. Noble's plays, is this: While the effects are sensational and stirring, they also portray life with vividness and accuracy. In other words these pieces are not all "blood and thunder," like dramatizations from Beadle or Munro, but have literary excellence, inculcate moral ideas, at the same time that they furnish all the dramatic excitement that could be desired. We think Mr. Noble is indebted to much credit for this. His plays will do considerable towards elevating the taste of the lower classes of theatre-goers, and for this reason they go down to their comprehension, and while pleasing their appetite for the sensational, point to and teach the way to something higher, and thus gradually improve the tone of public opinion. The parts last evening were generally well sustained, though we were sorry to find that Mr. Schwartz was not well enough to personate his character of "Tony Todd," which was somewhat marred and overdrawn by the gentleman who enacted it. In this connection it may surprise our readers to learn that Mr. Schwartz did not take well in San Francisco, while here he is considered not even second to Mr. Nobles in importance in this troupe. It is also well known that other actors looked upon as of little consequence there come here and succeed, and vice versa. Whose taste is at fault? The character of "Jack Ryder" is almost another "Phoenix," at least he reforms in about the same manner, and Mr. Nobles did the part with his usual grace and excellence. The scenes presented were life-like, especially the counting-room in the first act and the Texas cabin scene. The effects were well produced, the situations nicely worked up, and the acting of nearly all natural and good. To-night the "Phoenix" will be played, Mr. Nobles having decided to remain here one night longer than he expected.

Since the above was in type, we have been told that Mr. Schwartz did not play at all while in San Francisco, his voice being too hoarse to permit him to appear during the engagement. The remark on diversity of tastes, between here and San Francisco, holds good however. It is to be hoped that Mr. Schwartz will be well enough to play his great role of the German Jew to-night.

A Visit to the States.—Sister Lucy B. Young, wife of the late President Brigham Young, returned Sunday evening from a visit to the State of New York, upon which she started on the 21st of last July. She stopped one day in Chicago, en route, and while there visited the Wax Museum, and had the privilege of beholding herself in wax, in company with her husband and other members of his household there on exhibition. She says she did not recognize herself nor any of the rest, excepting President Young, whose image was the only one that bore the least resemblance to the original. Near by were also wax figures of "Bill Hickman" and "John D. Lee." Sister Young says she felt indignant, at first, to see such characters placed there with her revered husband, a man so good and great as Brigham Young, but was soon consoled by the reflection that he was no better than Jesus Christ, his master, who was crucified between two thieves, and that surely one of his disciples could well endure the ignominy of a wax representation of the character described. From Chicago, she went directly to New York and crossing to Brooklyn staid five days at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. James M. Hardie, this lady being a sister of Dr. Romania B. Pratt of this city. Mr. Hardie, whom our readers will well remember, is still an actor, and a successful one. He owns a handsome four-story house on Carlton Avenue, has a beautiful family and is doing well in his profession. They were overjoyed to see a visitor from Salt Lake and treated her with every kindness and consideration. Mr. Hardie was expecting to start soon on a starting tour through the Western and Southern States, with a play called "Child of the State," written by a friend of his, and arranged for the stage by himself. While in Brooklyn, Sister Young received a call from Miss Sarah Alexander, a former resident of this city, who also resides there. She next went to Williamsburg, near Buffalo, visiting relatives, and from there to Albion, Orleans County, on a similar mission. At Batavia she attended the Western State fair, and among other novelties, witnessed a balloon ascension. Visited Rochester and other large cities, and was successful in obtaining the records of her grandfather's family, to secure which was the main object of her trip to the east. Everywhere she was treated with great kindness, was an object of considerable interest from being a "Mormon" woman, and one of astonishment from being a staunch advocate of polygamy. She found many people imbued with the most absurd notions regarding Utah and her people, and took much pleasure in disabusing their minds in relation to the facts. She met numbers of good honest souls, among them her aged aunt in Williamsburg, a lady over 90 years of age, intellectually bright, remarkably active in body, and able to do her own work. Also another very intelligent lady, who had never before seen a "Mormon," and who sent for Sister Young, and after conversing with her, confessed that she believed in the gospel taught by the Latter-day Saints, and intended coming to Utah as soon as possible. Sister Young returns in good health, delighted with the success of her journey, and will leave for St. George in a few days. We are pleased to welcome her home.

Gone To His Rest.—A telegram from St. George to-day says: "George Lamb died at 8.30 a. m., sick three days."

Deceased was a resident of Nauvoo and will be remembered by many of the early settlers of this city. He arrived here in 1852, and resided in the Twelfth Ward. He moved to St. George in 1862, was industrious and moral and is called by his friends one of nature's noblemen. His age was about 65 years. He had sixteen children, one of them is Mrs. John Wm. Snell, of this city. He has gone to his rest in peace.
