It was proved by the experiments that all dogs have a very acute percep-tion of music tone. They could not only distinguish the "feed tone" from the half tone above and below it, but they caught it when sounded in a chord with other notes. Finally, after long train-ing, they showed ability to pick it out amid a jangle of discordant notes in which even the ear of a trained musi-clan failed to detect whether it was sounded or not.-New York Sun. Utica, N. Y., Oct. 19.-Heavy winds in the central Adirondacks have picked up the fires which raged during the long drouth and are during them on as furiously as before.

DOG'S EAR FOR MUSIC.

The capacity of dors to distinguish musical tones has been made the sub-ject of elaborate experiments by Dr. Otto Kallscher of Berlin, and the re-sults have just been published in tho proceedings of the Brelin Academy of Sciences. Dr. Kallscher trained his dogs to pick up and eat morsels of meat set before them only when a certain note was sounded. This he called the "feed tone." All the other notes in the scale, which he called "prohibition tones," were signals that the food in front of them was not to be fouched.
