

a little sum of \$355,000,000, obtained through the agency of overtaxation since the passing of the act of union. Under these circumstances, it is not considered unreasonable to ask the present government for \$40,000,000 to purchase the Irish railways. The Irish Parliamentary party claims to be the most practical political force in Ireland. Let us show the Irish people that it can get restored to them a portion at least of the money for which they have never received any consideration beyond plank beds and an unnecessary army of policemen."

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS.

An effort is being made to establish in Ireland branches of the Knights of Columbus, which appears to have a substantial footing among Irishmen in the United States. Members of the organization who have recently returned to Ireland, some of them after an absence of many years, are enthusiastic in promoting the idea, but it is somewhat difficult at the moment in face of the various movements that demand the support of the country to

get a new organization established on a solid basis. However, a few branches have been formed in Dublin and Belfast and a delegate or two from Boston is expected shortly to address meetings and explain the objects of the order throughout the country. "If new movements, new schemes and new ideas can produce anything substantial," says William Field, the picturesque M. P. for one of the divisions of Dublin, "Ireland must soon emerge from her industrial obscurity and take her place again among the most active centers of commerce in Europe."

IS IRELAND MUSICAL?

Professor Mahaffy's statement some time ago that the Irish were not a musical people is somewhat counteracted by the discovery that both Henry VIII and Queen Elizabeth considered them highly cultivated in that direction. It was Elizabeth who first used the harp of Ireland on one of her great seals, while the harp in the royal arms was placed there by command of Henry VIII in appreciation of Ireland's great proficiency in music. When this

discovery was brought under the notice of the professor by an accomplished Irish musician recently, he exclaimed, "My countrymen are quite welcome to the patronage of the distinguished personages named, but their appreciation of the music of the period does not alter my opinion." "Yes," retorted the musician, "even Henry and Elizabeth saw something to admire in the Irish, but Professor Mahaffy's mission on this earth appears to be to disagree with everyone who cannot read Greek." Since the professor made that statement with regard to Irish musical matters, he has been the object of much annoyance by the playing of tin whistles and other instruments of torture by some of his own pupils at Trinity college.

ONE GLEAM OF HOPE.

The one gleam of hope in the official return on emigration just issued is that there was a further slackening in the tide that flowed from Ireland last year. But unfortunately the exodus continues. Since 1851, when the collection of the returns was commenced, no fewer

than 4,028,580 persons of Irish birth have left their native land, the majority to settle in the United States. No country in the world could suffer such a drain, in proportion to population, without feeling its withering effects. In 1841 the Irish people formed nearly a third of the population of the United Kingdom. In 1901, when the last census was taken there, they were scarcely an eighth, and since then the disproportion has become greater. But it must be remembered that in losing over 4,000,000 of her sons and daughters, Ireland has lost much of the best of her own blood. The men and women who have gone have been mainly the young and the energetic—42.1 per cent of them who left last year were between 20 and 25 years of age—while the weak and the infirm have remained. In consequence the recuperative force of the country has steadily dwindled away. Hence the halving of the Irish population in a period that has seen the population of England and Wales more than doubled. The drain of Irish emigration must be checked if the dreams of Ireland's future are to be realized. And it can be

only done by making it possible for the best of the Irish breed to make a decent living in their own land.
