Y. P. C. U. to Meet—The Young People's Christian Union of this city will hold a mass meeting May 24, at 5 p. m., in the First Methodist church.

Peace Day Exercises—Special Peace day exercises will be held this evening, in the Jewish temple, where Rabbi Freund will speak on "Peace vs. War."

Benedict to Resign—R. E. Benedict, chief inspector of the forest service, with headquarters in this city, will resign July 1 to enter business in other fields.

McNitt Busy Morning—Auditor C. J. McNitt of the Short Line is moving his residence today, from 144 south Second West street, to No. 554 south Fifth East street.

Wolsh Gather Tonight—The Sons of Wales will gather this evening at the society's hall, God-b-Pitts building. It will be the regular monthly meeting, and a special program has been arranged for the occasion.

Dance Postponed—The dance that was to have been held at Wandamere last night, was postponed until next Monday evening, because of a rain storm. The dance will be held at the Athletic club. The Fifteenth Infantry band will furnish music.

Preps Present "Amazons"—The U. of U. preps will present A. W. Pinor's farcical comedy, "The Amazons," in the Twentieth ward amusement hall tonight. The students have been hard at work upon the play during the past month.

Walter Damrosch Coming—Word was received at the Knutsford Hotel this morning to provide reservations for the visit of Walter Damrosch, conductor of the New York Symphony orchestra, and party. The orchestra is now playing on the Pacific coast.

Photos Found—This morning a bundle of old photographs was found at the rear of the Volunteer's hotel. They were addressed from Perry Studio, Spokane, to C. M. L. Drug Dept. How they got down to this city, the police have been unable to determine.

He is to preach in St. Mark's cathedral in the morning and in St. Paul's in the evening. An informal reception will be tendered the visitor in St. Mark's vestry tomorrow evening. Dr. Lloyd is quite a distinguished man in the Episcopal church, having declined a bishopric, to which he was nominated by the Episcopal conference in Oregon, to attend a district convention of the church.

Order of Eastern Star—The third annual session of the grand chapter of the order of the Eastern Star (Women Masons), is being concluded today in Masonic temple, with 150 ladies present from different sections of the state. E. A. Leatherwood, patron of the Mizpah chapter, a limited number of males are admitted to the order, made the opening address yesterday, to which Mrs. Gertrude S. Hutton of Ogden, the associate grand matron. Thirty representatives of grand chapters in other states were introduced. The annual election is being held this afternoon, and installed in the evening.

REEL OF PEACE

Councilman Fernstrom So Declares at the License Committee Meeting.

MANAGER MURRAY PROTESTS

Stating That His Company Has a Certified Copy of All the Actions of the Council.

The representatives of the telephone companies in this city were before the council committee on license last evening, presenting their reasons why they should not pay the license fee assessed against them. The sensation of the meeting was the announcement of Councilman Fernstrom to the effect that the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company possesses no franchise in Salt Lake City. Manager Murray of the Bell company was present and vigorously protested against the charge, stating his company had in its office a certified copy of all the actions of the council affecting the company.

Mr. Fernstrom demonstrated the correctness of his position by referring back to the ordinances of 1903, which show that in 1879 a petition of William Jennings and others to use the streets of the city for telephone purposes was granted by the council. In 1880, these rights were transferred to A. J. Puttison & Company, but no transfer to the Bell company appears on record. Mr. Fernstrom also asserted that the underground wire franchise granted the company in 1894 had never been accepted, his reasoning standing the provision in the ordinance that to make it of effect the franchise must be accepted within 60 days.

Councilman Black suggested that the city examine the telephone companies the full amount of the license assessed against them. The one per cent of the earnings which the independent company is required by law to pay, the city, Mr. Black suggested, should be deducted from the amount of its license, assessment, and the Bell company be paid for all the telephones which it furnishes to the city. The matter was finally referred to the city attorney for an opinion.

The committee also notified Manager Murray that if the telephone poles were not removed from First avenue, where they interfere with the paving operations, immediately the council would order them removed at the expense of the company.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVORS.

Will Hold State Convention—une 19 In This City.

The executive committee of the state Christian Endeavor Union met last evening, at the city residence of C. E. Marks, president of the union. The committee decided to hold the annual convention Friday, June 19, in the Central Christian church, to this city. It was decided also, not to provide "outside talent" for the principal address, but to secure Rev. P. A. Simpkins, pastor of the Phillips Congregational church of this city, to deliver the address. The following vacancies on the board were filled: First vice president, Rev. N. S. Elderskin of Ogden; third president, Miss Edith Sherman of Provo; superintendent of the junior work, Miss S. B. Porter of Lehi; director, Rev. Benwick McNeice of this city. A series of topics are being prepared by the committee for papers to be read before the convention.

The convention will just precede that of the Washington state union. These last two conventions are to be addressed by Editor Amos E. Wells of the Christian Endeavor World, of Boston.

FOR FEVER PATIENTS.

St. Mark's Hospital Selected by Sanitary Committee for Isolation.

The sanitary committee of the city council last evening decided to recommend that the city join with the county in accepting the proposition submitted by St. Mark's hospital in the matter of establishing an isolation hospital for diphtheria and scarlet fever cases. St. Mark's hospital agrees to erect a building and treat cases for \$2 per day, each, the city and county to pay a bonus of \$400 a month each for a period of 10 years.
