The Brigham City Co-operative Cotton
Farm.

Editor Deseret News:

Below is an extract from a letter
which I received from James May. He
has charge of thirteen men that
went from Brigham City last fall to
open a cotton farm for the co-operative
institution in that city, near
the Virgin River, Washington Co.

PHILIP DIBBLE,
Centerville, Davis Co.

"We are five miles east of Wash-
ington on the Virgin river. We have
about 100 acres of land on the
west side of the river, and 800 on
the east side. We have dug a
ditch one and a half miles long,
three feet wide, blasted through a
point of rocks 55 feet long, 11 feet
deep, and 5 feet wide built a dam
across the river, 150 feet long, 40
wide, 4 1/2 high; cleared the brush off
fifty acres of land, plowed thirty
acres, put out 625 grape vines, and
1800 grape cuttings, planted 100
peach trees, and are all well at this
time. The Lord has blessed us in
all our labors, for which we feel
truly thankful. There is no wear-
ing in camp. I have not heard
an oath since I left home. We
have no smoking, chewing, or card
playing, but we have plenty of
books and quite a variety, so we
need not get lonesome for the want
of amusements. Is not this a good
showing for thirteen young men?
We expect to plant 35 acres of cot-
ton, 10 of corn, and 5 of lucern.

Ogden Junction, April 7—

Between eleven and twelve
o'clock last night, Deputy Sheriff
W. H. Clark was passing the
City Hall, when he heard a harsh,
grating noise resembling that of a
saw. He listened. The noise was
continued, and anon followed by
some hard thumps at a door on the
inside of the building. Believing
it to be the work of the prisoners,
he went to the jail, Mr. Clark in-
formed officer Child, and they to-
gether went to the jail. They were
not one moment too soon, for they
found that the prisoners had by
means of an old knife, and one side
of a pair of shears which had been
converted into a saw, cut through
the thick coating of zinc, and al-
most through the cell door. Their
intended escape was prevented.
The officers secured them for the
balance of the night, and this
morning they were removed from
the city jail and put to work on
the public roads. These three pre-
cious "birds" are the same who last
Saturday were fined for riding in
a U. C. R. car. Greuback not
to Ogden, refusing to pay their fare,
disturbing the peace and resisting
the officers of the law in the execu-
tion of their duty. Greuback not
being forthcoming, they were sen-
tenced to work it out.

The Church of England Oath
of Homage.

Earl Russell writes as follows
from Pembroke Lodge, Richmond
Park:

"At a time when much discussion
prevails on the subject of ecclesi-
astical and civil authority, excited
in this country by Mr. Gladstone's
admirable essays and his logical
delineation of his writings in the
pamphlet called 'Vindication,' which
no author is able to confute, and
the same controversy rages in Ger-
many, where the Roman bishops
proclaim the nullity of civil author-
ity and the supremacy of ecclesi-
astical laws over marriage and edu-
cation, it may interest some of our
readers and bishops to consult the
Oath of Homage taken by every
bishop, kneeling before the Queen
when he obtains from the Queen
the grant of the temporalities of his
see.

"Bishop of . . . Oath of Hom-
age. I, . . . Doctor of Divinity,
now elected, confirmed, and consecrated
Bishop of . . . do hereby
declare that your Majesty is the
only supreme governor of this
your realm in spiritual and
ecclesiastical things, as well as
in temporal, and that no foreign
prince or potentate has any juris-
diction within this realm; and I
acknowledge that I hold the said
bishopric, as well as the spiritualities
as the temporalities thereof, only of
your Majesty. And for the same
temporalities I do my homage pre-
sently to your Majesty. So help me
God. God save Queen Victoria."
