

ONE COUNTY GOES "DRY" IN IDAHO

First Election Under New Provisions of Local Option Law Has Desired Effect.

PROHIBITIONISTS WINNERS.

Carry the Day by Nearly Three to One—Vote is 3,162 to 1,308—Only One "Wet."

(Special Correspondence.)
BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 26.—The adjoining county of Canyon was yesterday declared "dry" by the vote of the people, it being the first county in the state of Idaho to hold an election under the provisions of the local option law, passed by the last session of the legislature. It resulted in a victory for the prohibitionists of almost three to one, the vote standing 3,162 as against 1,308. In three months, as provided by the law, the county will close all its saloons and be strictly on a prohibition basis.

Twenty-three of the 25 precincts voted "dry," the exceptions being Nampa, which city went "wet" by a majority of 20 votes.

will be held in Ada county, and if the results in Canyon county present any criterion by which forecasts can be figured, the county will follow the brave, which is a sample of her sister. Still, Boise has got to be figured with, for there is not the great expanse of country to draw from, as in Canyon county, to offset the city population. It will be the largest election in the largest town, Nampa, went wet, and no one at this time is able to tell which way Boise will go. There are powerful influences on both sides and each predict victory. Letting the leader of each of the forces speak we get the following contrasted views of the situation. Harry Kessler, chairman of the local optionists, says:

KESSLER CONFIDENT.
"It looks better every day. In fact we have the election won right now. The poll in the city shows that we will carry it by 1,500 votes and in the country our vote will be simply overwhelming. The women who have volunteered their services will be the potent factor in this election. Today I received word from the Maple Grove precinct which gave 90 votes for local option and 5 against it. We will have our largest vote in the city, in the north end of town."

Here is the public statement recently made by C. J. Lamson, chairman of the anti-prohibitionists in the county. "I am very much pleased with the outlook. Nothing now can happen to change the result. Our poll is about complete and will be finished tomorrow. It has taken a great deal of time, as we insisted upon having it complete and thorough. The only precinct which will probably lose are Meridian and South Boise. It will be very close in Meridian and we have not given up South Boise yet. We have enough votes to win, however, without the two mentioned."

"We claim 60 per cent of the non-committal vote and we will be apt to get most all of it. I cannot see where the local option strength comes in at all. We are very much satisfied with the result."

ALEXANDER'S STAND.

M. Alexander, the Democratic nominee for governor in the last campaign, has taken a decisive stand along with Governor Brady for prohibition.

"I am in favor of local option," he stated, "in not having anything better to vote for at this time. I am individually in favor of state wide prohibition. I look upon the local option as a makeshift of politicians in order that they can blow dry in one county and blow wet in another."

NEVER WAS A COWARD.
"I have never been a coward in my life on any question and I have never been afraid to express an opinion when called upon to do so. It seems to me that if it is a good thing to save my boy in Ada county, it is equally good to save my neighbors' sons in Canyon and Elmore counties."

"They talk about purifying the human family and lifting it to a higher plane of righteous living. It appears silly, beginning this purification on Sixteenth street in Boise City and running it to the Elmore county line. It is narrow and selfish."

"I believe in the old adage, 'The world is my country, good to do good is my religion.' To confine my goodness to a little circle prescribed by imaginary county lines, looks small and narrow to me. If I have a bad thing in my Ada county, it is bad in every county in the state and the people of the state of Idaho are the ones for this kind of purification and upbuilding."

"The best illustration can be given in Latah county, which went over 1,000 for state wide prohibition, which we incorporated as a cardinal plank in the Democratic county platform. Of course under present conditions one has to take the best of the two things and according to the plan, the best is to vote for local option."

LIBERTY LEAGUE JOINS "WETS."
Branding as tyrannical the provisions of the local option law which permits officers to break into private homes and arrest all people present, claiming the most enthusiastic workers for prohibition know the least about the conditions; asserting that prohibitory laws fail to prohibit but increase the evil of intemperance and encourage the sale of bootleg liquor, the executive committee of the Liberty League met yesterday afternoon and adopted strong resolutions in regard to the local option question, as well as voting to enter the campaign and assist the Ada county taxpayers' league in fighting the S. S. S. campaign.

And so the fight goes merrily on. Arrangements have been made by Chairman Kessler of the local option forces with a number of speakers of national renown to appear in the county during the next two weeks. Among them are: Judge Blair of Portsmouth, Ohio; Michael J. Fanning, the Irish orator of Philadelphia; Pres. Samuel Dickey of the Albion college, Iowa; and Miss Lucia F. Addition of Portland.

TAX LEVY.

State Auditor S. D. Taylor and Deputy George Lewis have just completed the tax levies and the problem of the various counties of the state as compared with the assessed valuations of 1908 for the general levy, and 1907 for the special levies. The gross or general levy will raise \$500,000 the rate being .00509 on the dollar.

RAILROAD ANSWERS CHARGES.

Summarizing the answer of the Oregon Short Line and Union Pacific railroads to the charge by the League of Southern Idaho Commercial Clubs that unjust freight rates were being charged, we have the following:

The rates published, enforced and existing are in all respects reasonable, just and valid under present circumstances and are in accordance with the legally published rates and tariffs on file with the commission.

In the transportation of coal from the Wyoming fields to Montana and Oregon points the competitive conditions are extremely different to those met with in the shipment of coal to cities and towns of southern Idaho. It is denied that the average cost per mile to them for carrying coal from the mining district to Butte and Anaconda is greatly in excess of costs of shipments per mile to Boise, Nampa and Caldwell and other places represented by the complainant.

A great percentage of coal cars are returned from Idaho destinations empty by reason of the fact that they are designed or adapted for the carriage of coal and for any other purpose limited to a very small class of property.

Defendants deny they have been unlawfully charging greater compensation in the aggregate for the transportation of coal, under more favorable circumstances and conditions, for a shorter haul than for a longer distance over the same line in the same direction, the shorter being included within the longer distance.

The present rates are not discriminatory in any particular. The rates and length of hauls set forth by the complainant are admitted as follows:

Rock Springs to Boise, 523.8 miles, \$4 per ton.
Rock Springs to Anaconda, 534 miles, \$3.25 per ton.
Rock Springs to Portland, 991 miles, \$4 per ton.

The relative distances between these points of destination and the mines at Kemmerer and Diamondville are the same, the rate of \$4 existing to Idaho and Oregon points while the rate of \$3.25 is in force to Montana cities, excepting for shipments of slack coal to Butte and Anaconda, a reduction of 25 cents per ton being provided.

GREAT STORM ON GULF OF MEXICO

In Texas Effect Was Felt in Many Places, Attended With Much Destruction of Property.

LOSS OF LIFE IS UNKNOWN.

At Tarpon Beach Every Building Except Lighthouse and Quarantine Station, Damaged.

Galveston, Aug. 27.—The West Indian hurricane, which has been slowly moving across the Gulf of Mexico in a westwardly direction for four days, hit the eastern coast of Mexico this morning and is causing great destruction along the coast. The wind blew 125 miles an hour. The effect of the storm was felt in southwestern Texas places, such as Brownsville, Point Isabel, Tarpon Beach, and other settlements near the mouth of the Rio Grande river, and disconnected reports say great destruction of property and crops and maybe loss of life have been recorded in that section.

It is announced by the weather bureau that this hurricane was about 200 miles wide in the gulf and it caused unusually high winds and high tides along the Texas coast, which was more than 300 miles from the storm center in its westward course.

The tide nearly 400 miles from the storm, rose from three to six feet, and the wind velocity along the Texas coast with normal barometer registered 50 to 60 miles an hour last night. This is the severest hurricane ever recorded in the gulf, and the reports, it is feared, will record loss of life.

The Mexican cable on the bed of the gulf from Galveston to Vera Cruz was snapped in twain by the storm. The cable broke at a point about 200 miles south of the Texas coast. The cable company refuses to give out any information.

HAVOC AT TARPON BEACH.

Brownsville, Texas, Aug. 28.—After passing the night at the quarantine station at Tarpon Beach, refugees brought to the mainland today by the life-saving crew from Brazos de Santiago tell of damage to the Pedro and Brazos islands as a result of the gulf storm which swept inland last night.

At Tarpon Beach every building except the lighthouse and quarantine station was either damaged or destroyed, but it is believed no lives were lost.

CHIEF SAM RESURRECTION

Confesses He Was Drunk and Riding In Boxcar When He Met Accident.

Missoula, Mont., Aug. 27.—Maj. Fred C. Morgan, Indian agent for the Flatheads, held a conference with Chief Sam Resurrection today and secured a confession from the Indian that he was drunk and riding from Butte to Missoula in a box car when he met with the accident that may result in his death.

Chief told Mr. Morgan that he started from Butte with \$6 in his pocket and at Garman met two tramps. He gave them money to buy liquor for himself and themselves. At Drummond he again furnished the finances for more liquor. A third time at Bonner he paid

for more booze and that is the last he remembers. Maj. Morgan says he is convinced that Sam fell from the train while intoxicated and that there was no foul play. He returned to the reservation on No. 3 on the Northern Pacific this afternoon.

INDIAN WOMAN AND LOVER SENT UP FOR MURDER

Helena, Aug. 27.—Upon entering plea of guilty to having poisoned "Young Flat" Wolf, at a picnic on the Crow reservation last January, Mrs. Comestrom-War-Pretty, wife of the dead man, and George Thomas, a young buck and her alleged lover, were this afternoon sentenced by Judge Hunt in the federal court to three years and 18 months respectively, at the Fort Leavenworth prison. About half the residents of the reservation were here as witnesses and a jury had just been secured when the accused changed their pleas. The poison was placed in a drink served the woman's husband and he died in great agony on Jan. 9 last.

LAND ON GREEN RIVER IS WITHDRAWN

Washington, Aug. 27.—Acting Secy. of the Interior Plerce today withdrew for temporary power sites 10,669 acres of land along Green river, Utah. This was done with the view of reporting to congress those withdrawals in order that proper legislation may be enacted by congress to preserve power sites and prevent monopolies. It was announced that the withdrawal was "in accordance with the policy and direction of Secy. Plerce." The withdrawal was the largest ever made for the purpose.

JAPAN'S NAVAL POLICY.

Program of Curtailment Begun by Announcing Three New Cruisers.

Tokio, Aug. 28.—The government made its first departure from its recently adopted program of naval curtailment today when it announced that three new cruisers will be constructed for the Japanese navy. Each of the cruisers will be of 5,000 tons and the Curtis turbine will be used in the power plant. The keels of the new fighting ships will be laid in the cities of Kure, Nagasaki and Kobe.

MIKE BARTLETT A SUICIDE.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 28.—Michael Bartlett, a railroad grader, committed suicide at Little Rock, near Olympia Thursday night by cutting his throat. He had been drinking heavily. Bartlett shot and killed his wife in this city six years ago in a most cold-blooded manner but was acquitted on the ground of insanity.

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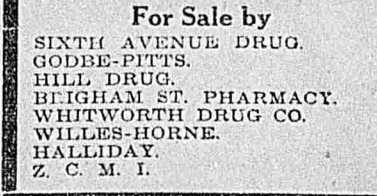

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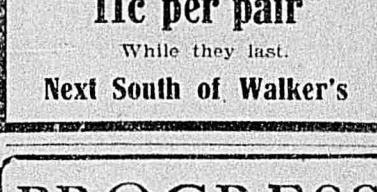
