

To Take Some Action to Avert "Threatened Disaster" in The Railroad World.

HIS ATTITUDE IS UNCHANGED.

No Intention to Make Any Extremely Radical Attack-Will Confer With Railway Magnates.

Washington, March 14 .- For more than 48 hours the White House and treasury department have been flooded with appeals for President Roosevelt and Secy. Cortelyou to take some action to avert the "threatened disaster" in the financial and railroad world. It can be stated authoritatively, however, that President Roosevelt will not change his attitude toward the allroads, though it is admitted that the administration has no intention of en-

tering on an extremely radical attack on the railroad corporations. While it is known that the visit of J. Pierpont Morgan to the White House last Monday night to induce the presideut to issue a reassuring statement to the country in regard to the admin-istration's attitude toward the railistration's attitude toward the reli-roads, and the apparent failure of the financier's appeal have had much to do with the panicky conditions that swert over Wall street today, President Reosevelt has repeatedly said that he is not an enemy of the railroads, and that those that obey the laws have wathing to fear from the sourcement that those that obey the laws have nothing to foar from the government. While it has not been definitely decid-ed, the president may issue a statement outlining his *I*, itude, after he has con-terred with Presidents McGrea, New-man, Mellen and Hughitt, on the rail-road situation. The conference with the four rall-The conference with the four rall-road magnates, which was granted by the president, at the earnest request of Mr. Morgan, will be held early next week. It is generally understood, by those close to the president, that the rallway officials will urge Mr. Roose-well to take some steps "to allay the while excitence to show the steps the allay the public anxiety now threatening to ob-struct railroad investment and con-struction and as to the relations be-tween the railroads and the govern-ment" ment."

Since Mr. Morgan's hurried trip to the White House, the president has held numerous conferences with Chair-man Knapp and members of the inter-state commerce comission in order that he may be in a better position to present the administration's side of the question when he meets the rail-road presidents next week. The administration is firmly con-vinced that the great unrest in finan-cial circles has been brought on by the arguments advanced by the railroad in-terests in trying to prevent "hostile e Mr. Morgan's hurried trip to

Washington, March H .- Secy, of the Treasury Cortelyou today made the following announcement:

Although believing that the conditions in New York are due to nothing for which the administration is responsible, the president believes he has done everything that can consistently be done to give relief to the money maraket. The order issued by Secy. Cortelyou vesterday, followed by the order of to-day, prevents the withdrawal of large sums belonging to the government and provides the way for the use of additional funds in Wall street. The first order put a quietus on the rumor that the treasury was to immediately withdraw the additional deposits put in the banks last Odder and the \$10,000,000 of additional currency taken out by the mational banks could be held by them without substituting federal for the state and other bonds with which it is now secured. This, it is pointed out, will prevent a sharp demand for government bonds for deposit as security. Another step which will put about \$1,000,000 a day into circulation is the deposit of customs receipts in the deposited bondholders that he will recleem with interest to July 1, when they will mature, any bonds of the 4 per cent funded loan of 1907, to an amount not exceeding \$25,000,000. "The secretary of the treasury has this day announced that any bank that increased its circulation under the terms of the department announcement of Oct. 22, 1996, and was required thereby to retire the same during the months of March and August, may retain said additional circulation upon tain said additional circulation upon due notification to the comptroller of the currency of its desires so to do, without change as to security for pub-ile deposits until further notice. VIEWS OF BRYAN.

"It has been the policy of railroad officials to avoid state legislation and seek their relief from the federal gov-ernment," said Mr. Bryan. "These big corporations prefer to deal with Congress for the reason that state legislatures are too near the people. I have said that the sooner the railroads are put on an honest basis the sooner the investing public will feel more se-

the investing public will feel more se-cure in doing business with them." "Do you still adhere to the position you took with reference to govern-ment ownership of railroads?" "I do, most emphatically, but I said at Madison Square Garden that uitl-mate ownership might prove to be the remedy. I did not say immediate ownership."

Under the recent Aldrich act, how-ever, the limit of retirement was raised from \$3,000,000 to \$3,000,000 per month, and engagements for the full retirement during March have been made and \$4,500,000 has been engaged for retirement during April and small-er amounts for succeeding months. It is believed at the treasury department that this plan will keep in circulation the full \$10,000,000 originally engaged for retirement.

The deposits of customs receipts, in accordance with the Aldrich act, is in-tended largely as a convenience to the collectors of customs at places where there are no sub-treasuries. Therefore there are no sub-treasuries. Therefore the sub-treasury cities of New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Chi-cago, St. Louis, Cincinnati, New Or-leans and San Francisco will receive no direct benefit by the action taken to-day. About 100 other large cities will be directly benefited. It is expected that banks named, which are already depositates for government funds, will now receive the customs collections in the same manner that internal reve-nue and miscellaneous receipts have hitherto been deposited with them. The advantages, however, that will accrue in consequence of this authorization will be comparatively small, in view of the fact that the receipts from customs in 1906 in all cities of the United States outside of New York were only about 30 per cent of the whole, about 70 per cent being collected in New York.
