SNOWSLIDES IN WEBER CANON.

Reported Rich Find of Silver in Taylor Canyon.—The Stock Growers' Attempt to Capture Cleveland.

Another meeting of the board of education was held last night in the purpose of discussing the Grant system school building measure. After two hours' debate, Mr. Thompson, the author of the bill, was the only one present, the others being detained elsewhere. Without unnecessary delay and acting under legal advice, the board notified the contractors, and became the owners of all claims against the building contracted by Messrs. Carr & Callahan are liquidated at once, the twenty per cent retained on the contract, which amounts to \$2000, will be deducted from the total sum paid. The bill is still outstanding about \$2000 for labor and material furnished to the contractors on the building, but as a large number of the creditors have made known their willingness to receive heavy discounts after lengthy discussion, it is recommended. 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William Miller, a miner of long experience, who is associated with Judge Patton, came in yesterday and reported he had made a remarkable discovery of silver in a tunnel he had been driving nearly to the summit of the range in Taylor's canyon. He brought several samples taken from the claim, one of which was a mass of native silver, while others are gold. His declaration was from the extension of the drift. The silver looks much as though it had been melted, and Miller thinks he has struck an old mine. Should the find hold up, you can imagine what effect it would have. The judge and Miller have a second Ontario, as there seems to be a very large body of ore.

Tonight Kristie C. Kanaga will give a series of lectures. Only a difference of \$100 prevents the settlement of the loss on the mailing of the Utah Loan & Trust company. Since their arrival, the insurance adjustors have been very busy figuring up the damage, and the company's proposal is to settle for \$45,000. The company demands \$50,000, and the building replaced in its former condition. To accomplish this Ogden builders estimate fully \$50,000 will be required. They are sending their things through their eyes, and have telegraphed to San Francisco for an expert builder, who will arrive to-night and begin his labors tomorrow morning.

Three cars of the shipment of California's exhibit for the World's Fair, including caravans, maps and drawings, were sent yesterday.

Judge Blackford presides on Extraordinary City Council Doings.

Provo, March 22.—At Monday night's session of the city council, the following items of business were transacted:

After the consideration of several positions on the matter pro and con, the appointment of James Gray as deputy

watermaster and road supervisor was confirmed.

Julian Riley, a saloon proprietor, called attention to the matter of Mr. Duggins, another saloon man, running an hotel in room without the license, within the prescribed distance from a church, and asked that the matter be referred, or he would ask the city for damages. The two saloons adjourned, referred to the committee on license.

E. A. Wilson was appointed to fill the vacancy created in the council by the resignation of William Probert, representative from the Fourth ward. His only opponent of the three present was Thomas John, and the vote was 100 against three in favor of Wilson.
