BRIGHAM CITY, Sept. 3d, 1872.

Editor Deseret News:

Dear Sir:—It would actually appear that some unscrupulous persons, not far from here, do supply the Indians with whisky regularly, from the fact that through the season we constantly meet with, or hear about, drunken Indians carousing in this county, greatly to the annoyance of our citizens, and sometimes women and children have been seriously exposed to danger. About a week ago, a party of Indians came to Bishop Ward's family at Willard City, insolently took possession of the table and helped themselves to all good things on it, and the family were glad to get out of their way. Subsequently, Mr. Ward came home, met the same party, or part of it, whom he rebuked, and slapped one of them on the face, who spoke mean language to a girl present to act as interpreter.

I could detail quite a number of similar circumstances that have transpired in and around Brigham City, with which I am personally acquainted, but it would take too much space. I should, however, not omit to mention that the party referred to at Willard had been seen by some person, passing through Ogden, with five bottles filled seemingly with liquor, the same day. Through careful inquiry, we have become satisfied that no liquor has been sold to Indians here or at Willard. Persons so low and reckless as to sell intoxicating drinks to these savages ought to be detected, if possible, and punished severely by the law. So fond have some of the Indians become of liquor that they would offer some persons in our streets one or two dollars to go and get 20 cents worth of liquor for them.

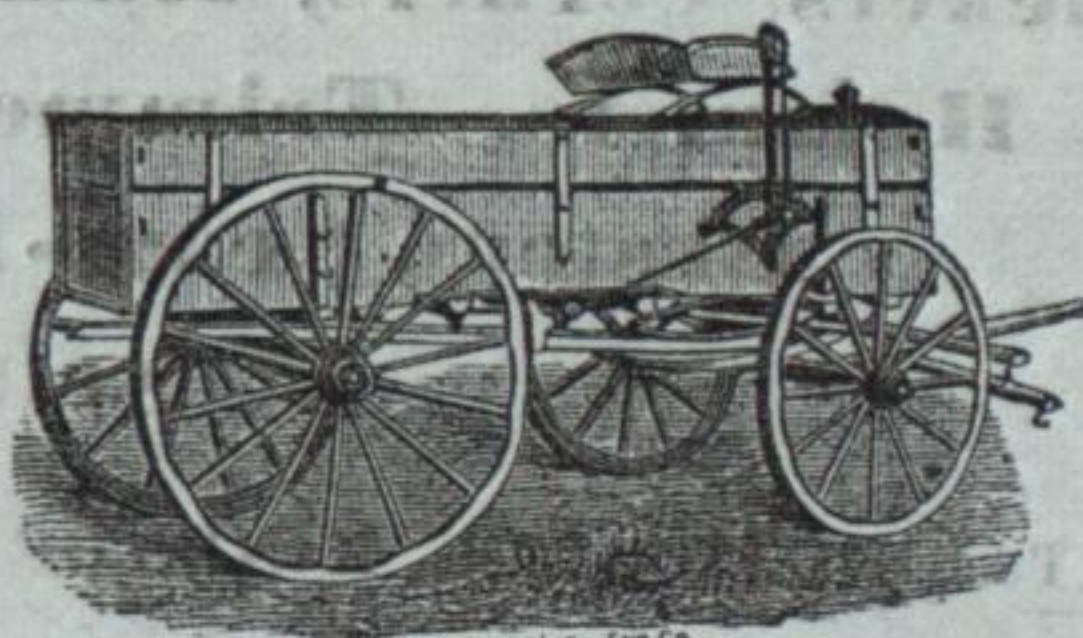

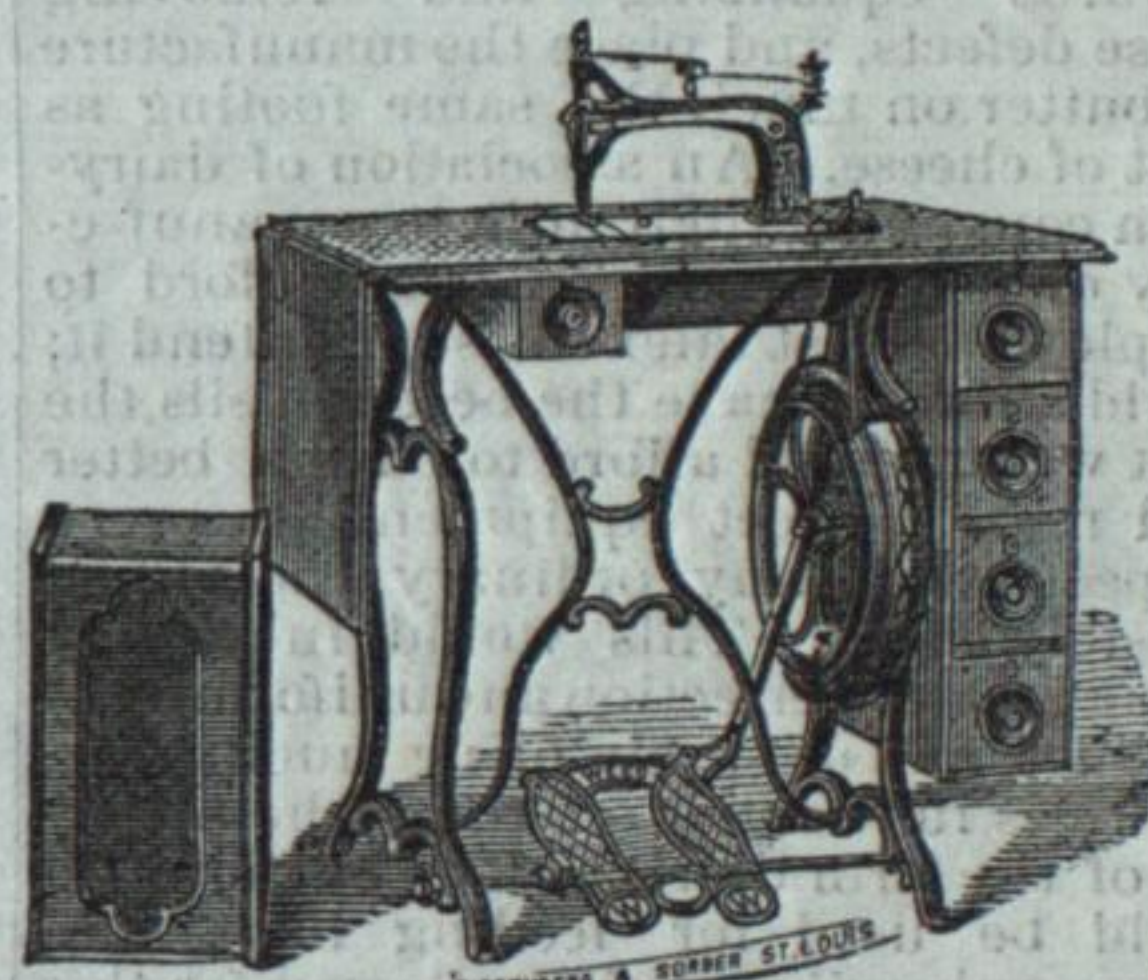
