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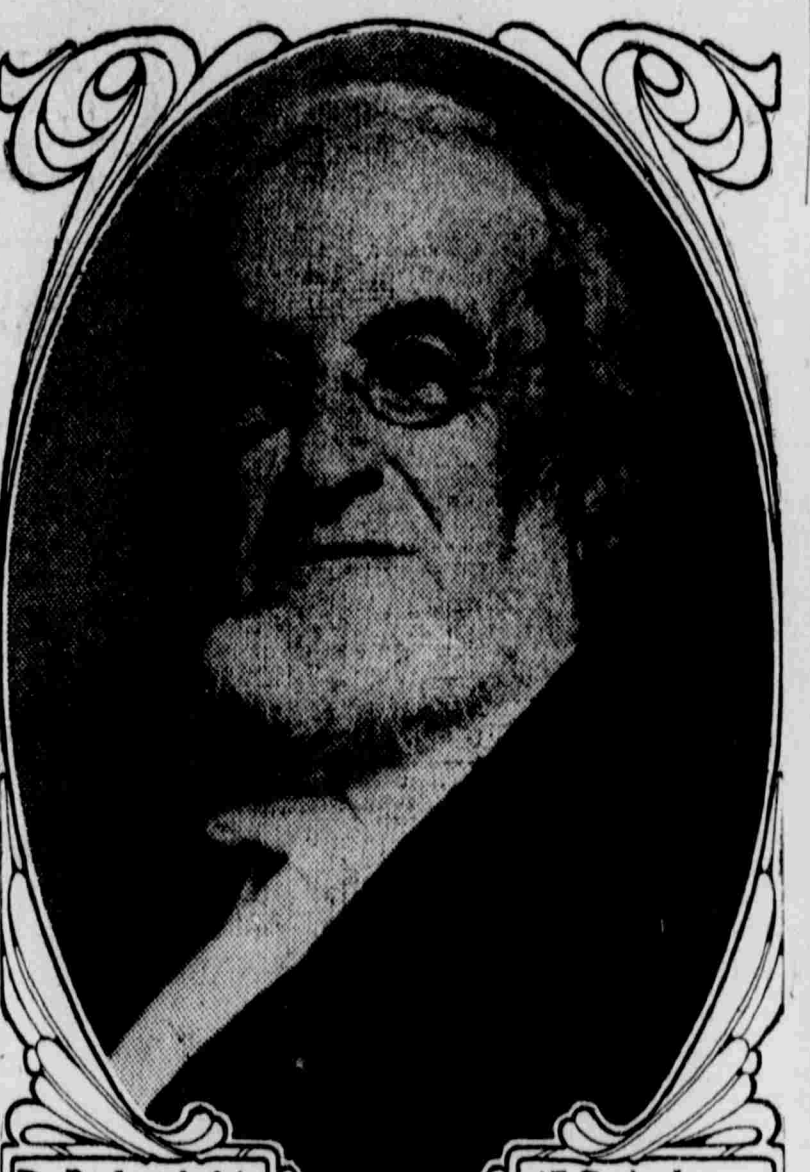

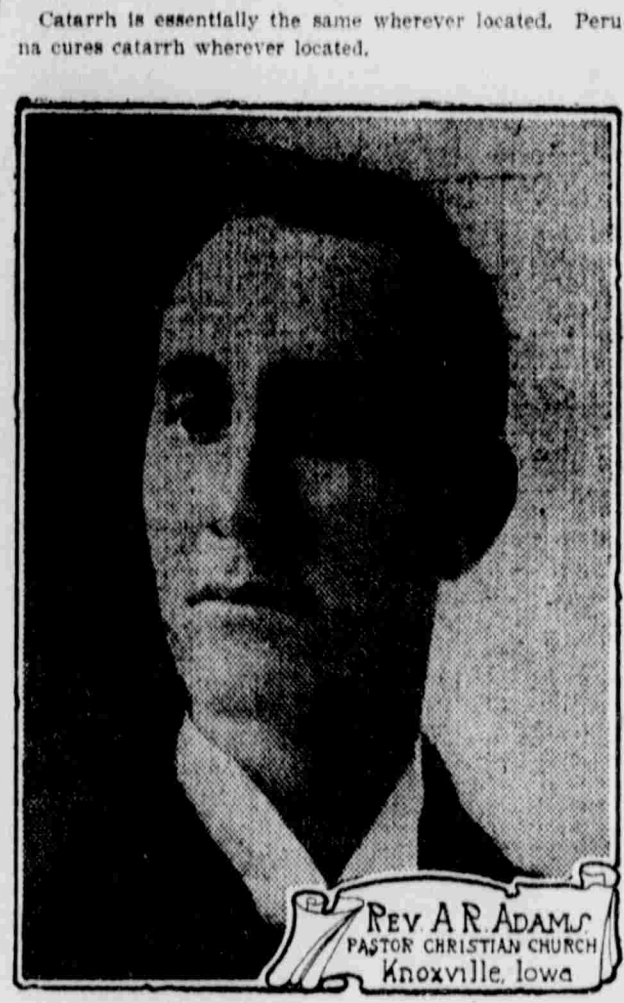

**Big Crowd Attends Opening of Season at Aqueduct Track.**

New York, April 15.—The Carter handicap drew between 15,000 and 20,000 persons to Aqueduct today when the Metropolitan racing season was opened. New York's only daily newspaper, the New York Herald Tribune, is doing so practically from start to finish. Peter Paul, the favorite, was second, driving, and Alton, who came out of the track in the stretch, was third. The time, 1:47 was within a second of the record for the stake.

The track was in first class condition but the weather was cold. Of the twenty-two called to go in the handicap five were scratched. Summary:
